FARM ACCOUNTS CLASSES START FOR RICKREALL

Dallas—Despite the heavy snowfall of Monday a representative group of farmers of the Rickreall district met with County Agent J. Beck and Ralph Reese, farm management specialist of the state college, for the purpose of starting a farm accounts class. The meeting was held in the grange hall at Rickreall Tuesday afternoon.

This is the second farm accounts group in the county, the other one being in the Monmouth district. In these farm accounts groups farmers are assisted in establishing a uniform bookkeeping system for their particular farm by means of which they keep a record of expenses and receipts for the different enterprises on the farm such as grain, sheep, dairy, etc. Such a record enables the farmer to balance up his books at the end of the year showing those enterprises which have made him the biggest return.

Important features of farm bookkeeping as in all other bookkeeping is the matter of inventory and the beginning inventory was one of the important things that was taken care of at the meeting Tuesday. At the end of the year another inventory is taken and used as a check against that taken the first of the year.

The keeping of accounts is receiving more and more attention from the most progressive farmers in various parts of the state and the group in the Rickreall district that is participating in this work is typical. The farmers who participated in the meeting Tuesday were: S. H. Robinson, W. O. Morrow, J. H. Harland, F. E. Pence, A. R. Cadie, Robert Pence and Otis Waite. Several other farmers were kept away on account of the inclement weather and it is expected that some of these will take up the work in the next few days.

CREAMERY HAS TRIPLED FUND IN TEN YEARS

Mt. Angel—At the annual stockholders meeting of the Mt. Angel Cooperative Creamery, Ed Overland was elected as director to take the place of Jake Ernston, whose term expired, and Martin Roostvald was re-elected as director. Other directors of the creamery are R. J. Berneing, Joseph Berni and Charles Bochsler, Frank Hettler is secretary and manager.

The annual report shows that the volume of business for 1928 was \$319,332.09, compared to \$104,040.89 in 1918. They manufactured 680,760 pounds of butter last year, and since the creamery was organized 5,639,675 pounds of butter was manufactured.

During the past year the creamery built and equipped a milk drying plant, which has proven very satisfactory. They have added a fleet of seven trucks to expedite hauling in milk, so it can be dried the same day as received. During the six weeks' operation of the milk plant 240,490 pounds of milk was received for drying, which is being distributed throughout the northwest.
