

NOTED PASTOR LAID TO REST; RITES TUESDAY

Woodburn—Funeral services for Rev. O. A. Burgess, who died at his home in Woodburn, February 3, were held in the Church of God chapel Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The sermon was preached by Rev. J. J. Gillespie of Salem and the music was by Mrs. May Stewart of Woodburn. Rev. Clarence Elliott, pastor of the Second Church of God of Portland, Miss Ruth Shrock presided at the piano. The pall bearers were D. W. Shrock, B. P. Shrock, Willis Rice, H. H. Wilson, S. Shanbeck and W. J. Livingston of the Woodburn congregation. Interment was in Belle Pass cemetery.

Otis Asa Burgess was born November 8, 1877 at Pomona, Kansas. He was the son of George W. and Fannie Howell Burgess. At the age of four years his parents separated and his father left him with a family by the name of White. While his father was gone to the Joplin, Mo., mines, the Whites moved to "No Man's Land," a district between southern Kansas and the Indian Territory. Through this move he was lost to both of his parents.

After his reunion with his father they moved to Smith Center, Kansas, where he entered the fourth grade in school at the age of 20, but by hard study he finished the elementary grades and was allowed to entrance into high school. During the war with Spain broke out he enlisted at the first call for volunteers and served as a corporal in company D of the 21st Kansas volunteers. When mustered out of the army he re-entered high school which he completed at the age of 25. He was an enthusiastic football player while in the army and coached the high school team during his final school years. By the aid of relatives he was able to find his mother and through his influence his father and mother were reunited.

On December 23, 1900, he was united in marriage to Etta E. McCarter who with three daughters survive him. The daughters are Francis May (Mrs. John T. Myers) of Woodburn; Pearl Victoria (Mrs. A. P. Gregory) of Oregon City, and Miss Olive A. Burgess of Woodburn, a teacher at Belle Pass school. He also leaves seven grandchildren. His mother, Mrs. Francis Howell Burgess lives at Smith Center, Kansas, the father having passed on two years ago. He also leaves a brother, Vinton Burgess at Richfield, Neb., an uncle and several cousins.

For the past 21 years Rev. Burgess has been engaged in evangelistic work in Washington and Oregon and also held pastorates at Colfax, Creston, the Saint's Home and Tacoma, Wash. He was principal of the Spokane Bible school in 1916-17-18 and superintendent of the Kansas City Bible school in 1923-24. At the time of his death he was a member of the national board of Sunday schools and religious education and a member of the board of trustees of the Anderson Bible school and seminary. While holding a revival at North Bend, Oregon, February, 1928, Rev. Burgess suffered a stroke of paralysis. A second stroke followed in May, of the same year, from which he partially rallied. He suffered a third stroke on the evening of February 2 and passed away the following morning.
