

M'GONEGAL IS TAKEN QUICK AFTER TUMBLE

Woodburn—Grove McGonegal, 66, a prominent resident of Woodburn, died suddenly at his home here Wednesday afternoon. McGonegal, who had been up town during the forenoon chatting with friends in his usual cheery manner, stepped out the back door and slipped on the back steps which were covered with ice. He came in the house and spoke of his fall in a joking manner, but soon began to feel strange and a physician was summoned. He was put to bed and passed away in about 20 minutes, probably from injuries to his spine. McGonegal was born February 21, 1863 in New York and would soon have reached the age of 66. When four years of age he moved with his parents to Jackson, Michigan, and at the age of 21 came to Oregon. For the past 45 years he has lived at St. Paul, Aurora and Woodburn. He was married to Christina Yergen Dec. 5, 1894, who survives him. Five children were born to this union, one of whom passed away in infancy. The remaining children are Glenn and Erma, of Los Angeles and Zora and Myrtle at home. His father, 94 years of age, lives in the old home in Michigan, and he also leaves five brothers, Austin McGonegal of Boyd, Montana, John, Lee, Archie and Zora at Jackson, Michigan.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed pending the arrival of the son and daughter from Los Angeles.

SNOW MAKES COON HUNT A SUCCESS
