

SCANDAL CASE FALSE RUMORS BRUSHED AWAY

Dallas—Sheriff T. B. Hooker, County Judge G. L. Hawkins and W. Harcombe, district attorney have found it necessary to sign and publish an affidavit in order to stop insidious rumors that have floated around Dallas since the trial of the juvenile run-aways last Saturday.

The rumors have involved many others in Dallas and considerable scandal had gained headway. The trial resulted in sending Clem Lute and Melbourne Miller, Dallas youths to the training school.

The affidavit was as follows:

"The attention of the undersigned has been called to certain rumors being circulated locally to the effect that other boys and men were involved or implicated in the investigation carried on by the authorities in the matter of the juvenile proceeding against Miller and Lute. These rumors are utterly unfounded and false in all particulars. No other persons were in any way implicated or mentioned in connection with the matter except the principals proceeded against."

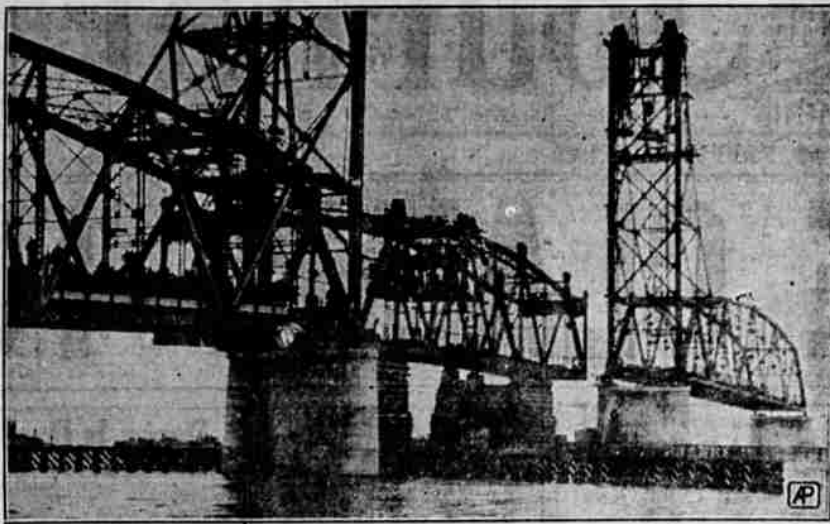
