SHEEP, GOAT, DATA READY

Data collected by Commissioner J. E. Smith for use before the legislative committee which is passing on the question of amendments to the dog license law, shows that in Marion county last year claims were paid for 554 sheep and goats, amounting to \$4389, or an average of \$6.13. His average is low on sheep and high on goats, but no segregation was made of the two, so a general average was hit on.

A total of 4882 dogs were licensed, the license money amounting to \$5072.93, of which \$1633.93 was used in collection and handling. The overhead is quite high as it is necessary to hire a man at the concluding part of the season to amend the dog law.

Two bills are now before the session to amend the dog law. One by Representative Swope of Polk county provides for increasing the fee on males from \$1 to \$3 a dog and on females from \$2 to \$3 a dog, and after March 1 adding a penalty of one dollar a dog in each case to pay for cost of collection.

The other bill by Representative Russell of Yamhill is much more drastic, calling for \$3 on male dogs and \$5 on female dogs, or a penalty of double after March 1, or \$6 on male dogs and \$10 on female dogs.

Commissioner Smith is much more inclined to favor the Swope measure. He states that most of the money is needed in the dog license fund to pay sheep owners a sufficient remuneration for losses, but that the license fees proposed by the Russell bill are much too high and would cause a revolt against the dog law all over the state if an effort was made to impose such a tax.

LITTLE GIRL HURT

The gash is in such a place in the eye brow that it most likely will heal without leaving a scar.

GERMANY SEES ONLY POVERTY IN REPARATIONS

Berlin—Since an international committee of experts has been named to meet in Paris this month to elaborate a plan for solution of the reparations problem, the Germans are collecting figures to demonstrate that the country is not so well off, as shown by the report of S. Parker Gilbert, agent general for reparations.

Mr. Gilbert is told by the press that he has not looked deeply enough under the surface. A series of figures purports to show that reparations would cost 25 per cent harder than in 1913, miners produce 27 per cent more, engineers 40 per cent and metal workers even 43, while wages have risen only from 7 to 10 per cent, and the consumption of various household staples, such as meat, coffee and cotton goods, has fallen off considerably in comparison with pre-war years.

Prof. Gustav Cassel, the Swedish economic expert, is widely quoted for his view that if the payment of Dawes annuities is to be continued with borrowed money, a time will come—after 10 to 20 years, according to interest rates—when Germany will be burdened with a new foreign debt.

The official service told that debt will equal the Dawes payments, and absorb the whole of Germany's capacity to pay, leaving nothing for the Dawes payments themselves, he says.

Mr. Smith has been ill with influenza for several weeks, but is now recovering and writes that he will come from his sick bed to attend the reception and to make the presentation of the furniture.

Washington (AP)—Secretary Jardine eliminated himself as a possible member of the Hoover cabinet in a formal statement Wednesday announcing that he had accepted a position as counsel for the Federated Fruit and Vegetable Growers.

SUICIDE IS FOUND
Portland (AP)—Shot through the temple, and with a wire bound about his waist and attached to a heavy piece of concrete, the body of a man was found Wednesday seated upright on the seawall of the Willamette river. The coroner said the man had committed suicide.

FREEZING MAY HAVE DAMAGED FILBERTS

County Horticultural Inspector Van Trump states that there is a question as to whether the filberts have been damaged by the freezing weather, with a possibility of some such damage, although it is still too early to state definitely.

He says that filberts usually bloom the latter part of December. This year they started about December 15 on the Harborside and blossoms were caught in the hard freeze and have been lying dormant ever since. To what extent the pollen may be damaged, he says, he cannot ascertain so far but it may be possible there has been some material damage.

MILK, SMELT, EGG BILLS ARE BEFORE HOUSE

Fitting conduct on Ash Wednesday, the first day of the Lenten season, was shown by members of the lower house when the first three bills taken on third reading Wednesday morning were the milk bill, the egg bill, and the smelt bill. Discussion on the three bills covering the staple foods of the season of penance occupied the greater part of the morning session.

Despite considerable opposition because of the hardship such regulation will impose on the owner of one, two, or three cow dairies, house members passed H. B. 322 which provides for the regulation, production, sale and distribution of milk, and cream under the supervision of the state dairy and food commissioner. Oxxman of Washington county, opposed the bill on the floor of the house and the four Marion county representatives were among the dozen house members who voted against the bill.

Chindgren's egg bill, H. B. 299, which classifies grades of eggs in the market with the grading under the federal act, was passed after considerable by-play on the definitions of "bad eggs."

Henderson of Multnomah suggested an amendment which would not only prohibit the selling of eggs of uncertain age but would also prohibit the "heaving of such eggs."

Robinson's bill which would have limited smelt fishing to fishing with gill or dip nets went down to defeat after much discussion. Robinson claimed that the bill would avoid wasteful waste of the smelt. Angell of Multnomah says that the bill would accomplish the opposite results.

"The purpose of this bill is merely to do away with almost the last vestige of our rights as American citizens—the rights to fish. Under this bill smelt could be taken only with gill or dip nets. What of the man who dips smelt from the Sandy with a hat, a bird cage or a gunny sack? He would be breaking a state law."

The bill was killed by a large "no" vote.

ROAR OF PLANES START MARCH 4

Washington (AP)—The roar of 60 airplanes of the army and navy will mark the beginning of the inaugural parade on March 4. Brigadier General Benjamin D. Foulois, of the heavier air forces for the ceremonies, announced Wednesday that the 60 planes would rendezvous over the capitol building at an altitude of 2000 feet and at the close of the inauguration ceremonies would form into a column and fly a general course above Pennsylvania avenue in advance of the land forces and civil parade.

The aerial group will pass in review before the presidential reviewing stand in front of the White House, circle southward around the Washington monument and fly back to Bolling field.

STOLEN CIGARETTES
Portland (AP)—A 16 year old girl used both hand and foot to break a window in a store here early Wednesday. Later she was taken to a hospital suffering from loss of blood as a result of severe cuts on a wrist and ankle.

Police followed the girl from the store to her room by a trail of blood. She was unconscious when found.

The girl regained consciousness long enough to say that she and another girl had broken the window and had stolen several cartons of cigarettes.

Both had been drinking, the girl admitted.

DAMAGE IS HEAVY
Los Angeles (AP)—The California Fruit Growers' exchange estimated damage to southern California's citrus crops in the recent cold weather at 10 per cent. Exposed orchards without smudging equipment were believed to have lost their entire crop.

STILL OWNER IS SHOT BY STATE PROH OFFICER

Toledo, Ore. (AP)—Clinton Kelly, 32, an alleged moonshiner, was shot to death by a state prohibition officer here early Tuesday after a gun battle in which L. O. McBride, county deputy sheriff, narrowly escaped death. The bullet that killed Kelly was fired by J. J. Zimmerman, state dry agent.

In Kelly's house was found a still, two barrels of mash and 15 gallons of moonshine whiskey.

Three officers, McBride, Zimmerman and Ed Payne, night marshal, acting on a tip they had received, visited the house here shortly after midnight. Payne was stationed at the front door and Zimmerman and McBride went to the rear entrance.

McBride knocked and Kelly whispered "Who's there?" "You had better come out," McBride answered, "the place is surrounded."

Kelly did not reply, and McBride crashed his shoulder against the door, springing the lock. The door cracked open but a few inches, and McBride threw the rays of a flashlight inside.

Immediately three shots rang out from the inside. The bullets grazed McBride's head and blackened the side of his head. McBride fell to the porch, stunned.

Zimmerman, who believed his companion had been killed, ran to a window and fired three shots through the drawn curtains.

Kelly cried out "I'm shot," and the officers entered. The alleged moonshiner had a bullet through his heart.

The shots fired at McBride were from a heavy 25 caliber automatic pistol.

An inquest was to be held Tuesday.

ROTARY HEARS OF ABE LINCOLN

The personal and private life of Abraham Lincoln was not forgotten after that of a century. English gentleman as was that of George Washington and he possessed a varied mixture of characteristics and mental traits. Senator B. L. Eddy, of Roseburg, told the Rotary club Wednesday noon. His reasoning faculty with every problem regarded with logic, was outstanding though he was slow to arrive at a conclusion, the speaker said.

Any weakness he might be accused of possessing was in the small affairs of life and by many he was not regarded as a master in his own house though in political affairs and statesmanship he had a will of iron, Senator Eddy declared.

He saw the humor of nearly every situation and kept his own counsel, never expressing opinions at large. Some of the great men which whom he was surrounded were never able to fathom Lincoln. Other outstanding characteristics were his vision, purpose in life, ambition and conservativeness.

TRANSPORTATION IS NEED OF GRAIN MEN

Arlington, Ore. (AP)—Permanent organization of a transportation company of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League was set up here Wednesday and provided with sufficient funds to enable continued cooperation with other groups interested in water transportation on the upper Columbia river and its tributaries. The present agitation for such transportation will not be permitted to die, wheat growers of the Inland Empire said Wednesday at the concluding session of the Columbia basin wheat conference.

Delegates to the conference were told, however, that it will be several years before complete development and use of the project is realized.

SCORPED SOAP CLAY DUE FOR NEW INTEREST

Washington (AP)—Bentonite, the "soap clay" which had a brief boom in the '80s is being brought back into prominence by the curiosity of modern scientists.

Studies conducted by the bureau of mines and the Mackay school of mines at the University of Nevada indicate that this odd, little known mineral may have a wide variety of uses in present day life.

Described as a rock containing 75 per cent or more of claylike silica, it has the peculiar property of being capable of absorbing many times its volume of water, taking on the appearance of soft soap.

It is abundant in various parts of the United States, Canada and other countries. Hudson's Bay posts once used it for washing blankets, and in 1888 it was put on the market at \$25 a ton. The price quickly dropped to \$5, however, and interest in it was not revived until a few years ago. Among oil drillers it was merely a nuisance.

Since the scientific investigation of its properties was begun, numerous uses for purified bentonite have been suggested. While only a few have been tested, the suggestions point to usefulness in the manufacture of paper, linoleum, certain cloth, cordage, rubber, ceramics, Portland cement, lubricating greases, putty, phonograph records, crayons, plastics, paste, glue, shoe and stove polishes.

Some of its qualities would make it useful, it is thought, in the manufacture of soaps, horticultural sprays, animal dips, insecticides, fungicides, paints, ink, waterproofing plasters and dynamite; in the de-inking of printed papers, the treatment of molasses, the refining of oils and fats, and in the removal of water from petroleum; as a water softener and an aid to fertility.
