

DAUGHTER OF PIONEERS IS LAID TO REST

Woodburn—The last rites for Mrs. Sarah E. Hall, wife of B. F. Hall, were held at the Methodist Episcopal church in Woodburn Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The sermon was preached by Rev. C. L. Dark of Odell, former pastor of the deceased. Rev. Aaron J. Neufeld read the scripture lesson and prayer was offered by Rev. D. J. Gillanders of Monitor. Music was by a mixed quartet, Mrs. Vern D. Bain, Mrs. A. J. Neufeld, James H. Lively and S. E. Brune, with Miss Wilma Morrison at the piano. The pall bearers were three grandsons and three nephews of the deceased, Franklin and Charles Tyler, Oakley Strang, Harley Boney, Willard Cole and Victor Ballentine. Interment was in the family lot at Belle Passel cemetery. There were numerous floral tributes from relatives and friends.

Sarah Ellen Bonney, daughter of Bradford S. and Almina C. Bonney, early pioneers of the Oregon country, was born at Belle Passel, Oregon, August 25, 1853, and died at her home in Woodburn, February 26, 1929, at the age of 75 years, six months and one day.

She was married at Belle Passel, Oregon, June 8, 1873 to B. F. Hall, a son of Reason B. and Martha Wright Hall, who were also early Oregon pioneers, crossing the plains in 1847. Mr. and Mrs. Hall spent the early part of their married life at Buena Vista, Oregon, where they united with the Methodist Episcopal church about three months after their marriage. Later they moved to Hall's Ferry where they lived for a number of years and in 1904 moved to Woodburn where they have since made their home and have been active in the work of the Woodburn church. For a number of years Mrs. Hall was president of the Ladies' Aid society, and was an interested worker in all lines of religious activity.

The surviving relatives are the husband, B. F. Hall, two daughters, Mrs. Carrie Tyler of Elliott Prairie and Mrs. Althea A. Strang of Seal Rock, Oregon; four grandchildren, Franklin, Charles and Martha Leu Ella Tyler and Earl Oakley Strang, Jr.; one brother, J. M. W. Bonney of Carlton, Oregon, and three sisters, Mrs. Carrie M. Young of Mrs. Etta P. Hall and Miss Ina D. Bonney all of Woodburn. She also leaves many other relatives and numerous friends.

Mr. and Mrs. Hall celebrated their golden wedding in Woodburn on June 8, 1923 and next June they would have been married 56 years.

OLD LAND MARK AT MT. ANGEL IS TORN DOWN

Mt. Angel—One of Mt. Angel's oldest landmarks, which is known to the old timers as the old Freidman building, located next door to Buehler's store, is being torn down. J. W. Ebner purchased the building from John Freidman in 1892, and started his first store in it, which was confectionery, groceries, hardware and shoes. The post office was also housed in the same building for a number of years, and Mr. Ebner was appointed postmaster.

As business prospered, more space was needed, so the original building was moved to the rear and a new addition was built on the front. This has remained the same until the present time.

About 18 years ago, Mr. Ebner moved in his new hardware store next to the Bank of Mt. Angel, and since then the building has changed hands frequently. John Unger, Albert Bourbonnais, Peter Biermeyer, John Drescher and Henry Salfeld, each in turn owned the building for short periods. The last owner was William Worley, who sold the building to Jacob Koppes to wreck.

Various business enterprises have been housed in the building. Restaurant for a short time. Then Joseph Scharbach used it as a restaurant for a short time. Then it was used for a bakery by Walter Jann and later as a pool room and confectionery by Peter Biermeyer and Harry Craig.
