

FASTER TRAIN LIMIT PASSED IN ORDINANCE

Woodburn—Four ordinances were passed by the Woodburn city council at their regular meeting Tuesday night, the most interesting of which was an ordinance amending ordinance No. 140, relative to the speed of railroad trains and engines in the corporate limits of the city which raised the speed limit from 10 to 25 miles per hour.

An ordinance was passed providing for the improvement of Sixth street from the northerly line of Harrison street to the northerly line of Fir street in accordance with plans and specifications now on file in the recorder's office and the recorder was instructed to advertise for bids for the necessary gravel for this improvement.

An ordinance providing for the assessment of the cost of the construction of certain sidewalks against the abutting property was passed as was also an ordinance providing for the issuance of bonds for the cost of the improvement of North Second street in the sum of \$492.58, four bonds to be in the denomination of \$100, and the fifth in the sum of \$92.58. This ordinance carries an emergency clause.

The matter of grading Oswald street from Doud street to the railroad property was referred to the street committee. Gravel is to be spread on this street by the property owners.

V. P. Nathman and E. E. Piper requested permission to improve Fifth street from Grant to Hayes by graveling, said gravel to be furnished by the property owners and grading to be done by the city. This was also referred to the street committee.

On motion the mayor and recorder were instructed to enter into a contract with the Seal Tyle Roof Coaling company of McMinnville to recast and repair the city hall roof at a cost of \$138.

Water Superintendent Soule was authorized to purchase a die for threading steel pipe.

Bills for the month were ordered paid and the council adjourned.
