

ALBANY CHILD, 2, IS RESCUED FROM WATERS

Albany—Calvin, two year old son of C. O. Burrell, narrowly escaped drowning when he fell into a hole in Pennywinkle creek, Wednesday afternoon. E. S. Geer, saved the lad after he had gone under the water twice. Calvin and several playmates had wandered away from the immediate neighborhood and while walking along the edge of the creek young Burrell slipped and fell in. Geer was working in his garden nearby and heard frantic calls for help from several women who rushed to the scene.

Geer restored the boy to consciousness by applying artificial respiration.

Neither the child nor Mr. Geer experienced any ill effects from the near tragedy.

ARMY DESERTER IS TAKEN AT ALBANY

Albany—Arthur Brobert, 18, twice deserter from the United States army, was arrested in Albany Wednesday evening and returned to Vancouver, Wash., Thursday, after having been a deserter from that place since February 11. Brobert was working in Albany at the time of his arrest.

The young man enlisted in the fourth U. S. cavalry at Fort Meade, South Dakota, on October 8, 1928. He was picked up in California and taken to Vancouver barracks.

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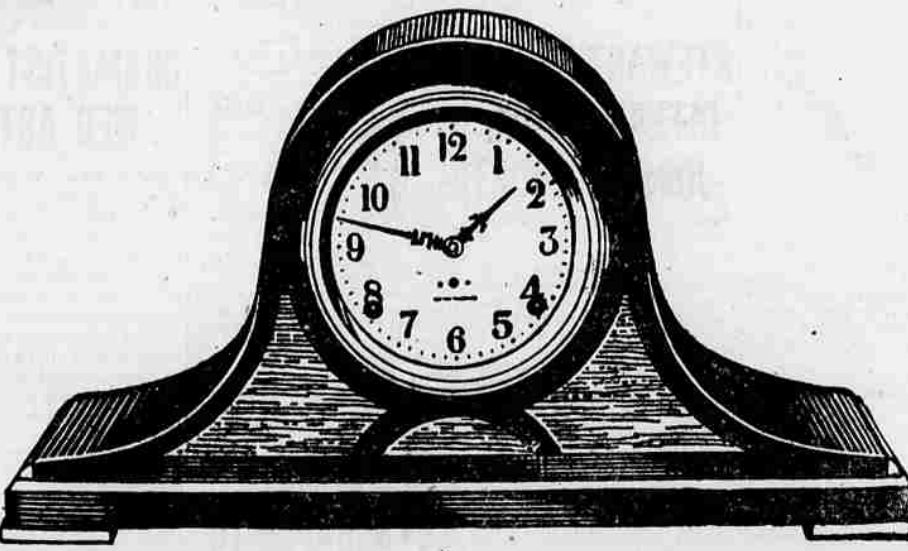
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
