

EIGHTY ATHLETES READY FOR ANNUAL HOOP BOUT

FOUR QUINTS GIVEN EDGE OVER OTHERS

Eighty athletes from various parts of the state were in the city Wednesday awaiting the blast of the referee's whistle, which will send 10 of them into the first game of the series which will close Saturday night. By 9:30 o'clock of the final day of competition 75 of the boys will have been eliminated and five will stand in the front row at Willamette gymnasium and receive the beautiful trophy, emblematic of the state interscholastic basketball championship. Which will receive the laurels is a mooted question.

Judging from season performance, Medford, Chemawa, Washington high of Portland and Astoria stand out above the others. Upsets in the dope may be expected, however, and Russ Rarey's Tillamook cheese makers may throw a monkey wrench into the whole proposition. James, the youth with the steady eye and uncanny ability to loop them in from almost any position is with the Tillamook squad again. It was this young man who threw such a scare into Medford last year, when the cheese makers were leading at half time in Medford's first game. Tillamook defeated Washington high in an early season game, but was in turn beaten by Washington.

Bear stories from Medford and Washington add some uncertainty to the performance of those teams. Melvin, the ace scorer of the pear pickers made the trip with his teammates after having suffered a slight attack of appendicitis. Last year Melvin played the final game with a badly cut hand. Now Coach Eldon Jenne of the Columbia broadcasts the news that Ed Lewis, the lanky center, has a bad foot. Lewis has been suffering more or less all season with a bad ankle and the information probably is correct. Jenne's regular center, Arnold Heikonen will be on the bench during the first part of the tournament, Jenne intimates.

If, as a result of play, Washington and Medford should be thrown into competition, it's going to be worth while to see "Red" McDonald, clever tip-off man of the pear pickers, and Ed Lewis in action. Lewis will have several inches advantage in height over McDonald, but the latter is just a trifle fiercer than the usual run of players and may out-smart the lanky Colonial. Myrtle Point is one of the schools represented which has not participated in tournament play here before, or at least for a number of years. Eugene is back after having missed a year. Two years ago the Eugene men took the title away from Salem but the next year were hopelessly outclassed. This year their record is none too impressive.

McLoughlin high of Milton-Freewater is in the line-up again. The team from the northeast part of the state has suffered several defeats this year.

SEVERE CHANGE FOR WALLOWA

From winter to spring within less than 24 hours is the experience of the Wallowa basketball team which arrived here Monday in an effort to become accustomed to the lower altitude as much as possible before the members take their place in the annual struggle for state supremacy. Leaving a country where the altitude is close to 3,300 feet, and with four feet of snow blanketing the ground, and dropping down to virtual sea-level with its much heavier atmosphere, the boys from the far northeast part of the state find it a difficult task to become acclimated.

According to Coach Charley Dawson, who by the way, won a warm spot in the hearts of local fans by his work in the ring several years ago, says his proteges have difficulty with their breathing and have trouble in shaking off a lethargy which attacks athletes coming from a higher altitude.

Chicago, (AP)—Dormant boxing ability, which was not shown until Tuesday night, Wednesday enabled Otto Von Porat, young Norwegian, to project himself into the group of leading heavyweight fighters, who have hopes of assuming the title which the retirement of Gene Tunney left vacant.

Von Porat, heretofore regarded as a man who possessed a hard right swing and little else, surprised 11,000 people last night by outpointing Tom Heeney, New Zealand, whose claim to heavyweight recognition has rested on his boxing ability.

The Norwegian exhibited a left hand jab which held Heeney at bay and he combined the left with a right cross which rocked the New Zealand.

PARRISH WINS OVER STAYTON

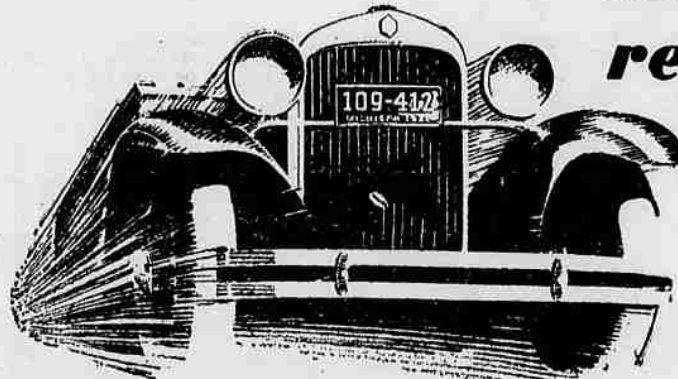
