The summer session will be under the direction of Dean Frank M. Erickson of the college of liberal arts.

For the first time in three weeks everyone of the 54 Salem high school teachers was on the job Wednesday all day. There have been a number of cases of illness among the faculty members this winter.

Mr. Angel, Gervais and Eldridge school children will be given toxin anti-toxin immunization against diphtheria by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, in a clinic Thursday. Dr. Edward Lee Russell will hold clinics at Gervais, St. Louis, Fairfield, Parkerville and Eldridge schools on Thursday and on the same day, Dr. Ethel Brunk, county dental officer will conduct dental clinics at Battle Creek, Pleasant Point, Turner and Illihee schools.

Superintendent of Salem schools, George W. Hug, has wired word of his safe arrival in Chicago. Mr. Hug is northwest representative at the national convention of the secondary and higher education association. He is president of the north-west association. On his first day in Chicago, Hug attended a meeting of the Chicago Rotary club.

Professor Nelson Bessing of the University of Oregon school of education addressed two meetings in Salem Wednesday afternoon. At 3 o'clock he met with the junior high school supervisors and department heads of Salem schools and at 4 o'clock he addressed a meeting of the Salem Teachers' association.

Barney Cameron, president of the Salem high school student body, presented a plan for an all-school entertainment before a meeting of the principal, the dean of girls and the three class advisors Wednesday morning. Because of the size of the student body an all-school entertainment has been frowned on by the faculty, but Cameron has worked out a plan whereby the 1300 students can be conveniently entertained. His plans would make each class responsible for several side-show stunts and two vod-vil acts. Sufficient policing activities to keep the group in order are included in the plan.

CASES OF DISEASE IN COUNTY SCARCE

Excepting a mild epidemic of scarlet fever in the Sublimity and Stayton districts and occasional cases of small-pox and mumps, the communicable disease condition in Marion county is remarkably good for this time of year, reports Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer.

"The smallpox cases in the Hubbard district which appeared shortly after the holidays," says Dr. Douglas, "have been cleared up without spreading outside the family of transients in which it occurred. This was a most virulent form of smallpox and all efforts were made to prevent its spread."

Dr. Douglas says that the diphtheria immunization clinics will be started in the Salem school next week. Approximately 1000 of the 5000 Salem school children have been immunized against diphtheria but before security against disease from this cause is assured it is necessary that 60, and preferably 70 percent of the children are immunized, says the health officer. In the county the average of immunizations is greater than in the city of Salem.

Girls Wear Short Skirts; Are Beaten

Karlshad, Czechoslovakia (AP)—Four girls were beaten by members of a church congregation at the village of Buchau because the village preacher said a spirit appeared to him and told him the recent severe cold wave was caused by the wearing of short skirts.

The reports said the congregation met four girls wearing knee length dresses at the door of the church and beat them.

PORTLAND GETS RADIO STATION TO AID FLIERS

Portland (AP)—A powerful radio station, one of a chain of seven to be built on the Pacific coast airways, will be ready for operation on Rocky Butte, near here, within two months, W. A. Cutting, in charge of operation, announced.

The station is to cost \$20,000 and will be in direct communication by code and the spoken word, with planes in flight.

The stations are being built by the airways division of the department of commerce.

Six other stations will be located at Medford, Los Angeles, Fresno, Oakland, Redding and Seattle.

From the coast chain movements of planes will be directed by broadcasting of weather reports and movements of other ships.

A 24 hour service will be maintained by the Rocky Butte station. Automatic printer telegraphs similar to those used by the Associated Press will keep the municipal airport here in touch with all information issued.

There will be a microphone at the municipal airport so either government operators or airport officials may talk to the planes in flight.

BAR AMERICANS FROM INVESTING IN STOCK ISSUE

London (AP)—Decision of the directors of the British General Electric company restricting the issue of new shares to British subjects was approved by a large majority of shareholders Wednesday.

The meeting was crowded to overflowing when Sir Hugo Hirst, the chairman, explained the board's reasons for asking authority to increase the company's capital by the creation of 1,600,000 pounds ordinary one pound shares. He said that the General Electric company had always been looked on as a British concern and that it was vital that it retain its British character in order to secure the continuity of the employment of its 35,000 workers and their well being and happiness. For these reasons it was proposed to confine the present issue to the British public.

"The American public, who before long may hold practically all our ordinary shares issued, are barred from giving us this help by their protective fiscal legislation," he said.

The Daily Mail printed an editorial on Wednesday in which it said that Great Britain needed all the foreign capital it can attract and to repel the foreign investor "by mean or unworthy treatment" was to strike a terrible blow at British industry.

MRS. SKOPIL TO HEAD CAMPAIGN

Mrs. Ralph Skopil of Salem has been chosen as local manager for the Salvation army's campaign for funds with which to construct a new building to replace the present army hall that has been condemned. The army intends to make the campaign a purely local enterprise carried on by local people. No help is to be brought here for the purpose.

The army is rather modest in its demands and the financial outlay is not to be a large one. Just how much is to be expended on the building has not yet been decided.

The Salvation army has for many years been an active factor in Salem relief and charity work and holds the friendship of the substantial people of the community. Indications are that the army's appeal will be given a sympathetic hearing in the community and that the required fund will be raised.

GENERAL MOTORS INVADES GERMANY

Berlin (AP)—The German automobile industry reacted turbulently to reports of an impending purchase of a 75 per cent interest in the German Opel automobile concern by the General Motors company at a reported price of approximately \$30,000,000.

The reported deal—which generally is expected to be concluded within a few days—will be the latest single American investment in Germany since the world war and is expected to prompt the Ford Motors company to open a retailing campaign in the European automobile market.

The imminent signature of the contract will cause an upheaval in the German automotive industry, financial observers assert, leading to vast mergers and the ultimate birth of an automobile trust to fight foreign motor invasion, principally America.

Dublin (AP)—The Free State will soon appoint ministers to Paris and Berlin with the same status as the minister to Washington. The plan has the support of all parties.

CONFESSION CLEARS CONDEMNED SLAYER

Washington, (AP)—A confessed murder story started action Wednesday to prevent the death tomorrow of Clarence Carter on the gallows at Dallas, Texas.

Major General McArthur, commanding the Philippine department, informed the war department that "Private Walter Dell" serving in the Philippines had confessed to the murder for which Carter is under sentence to hang Thursday.

AUTHORITY TO DEAL IS GIVEN TO COMMITTEE

Authority to deal with the state and owners of private property was issued Tuesday night at a meeting of the joint municipal airport commission which has virtually decided upon locating the airport south of the penitentiary on state owned land.

Two tracts in this vicinity are owned by the state and decision as to which will be purchased will not be made until further negotiations are carried on with other property owners. One site is adjacent to the state highway shops and the other a little further south. Price asked per acre by the private owners will probably be a determining factor in making the selection.

Negotiations with the state board of control, authorized by the recent legislative assembly to fix a price upon the land, will be carried on by Jack Elliott, Brainerd C. Small and Carl Nelson while H. R. Crawford will head a committee conferring with the private land owners.

Construction work will start as soon as possible and it is planned to hold a formal dedication in connection with the three-day state convention of the American Legion here beginning August 8. Plans do not call for an extensive aerial circus but fliers from all points in the northwest will be invited to the ceremony. Graveled runways, drainage and lighting facilities will be provided during the summer with hangars, weather station, machine shops, service shops, service equipment and attendants' quarters will be provided as rapidly as possible.

POLICE TO HELP CHECK SMOKING BY MINOR GIRLS

A determined, non-stop effort to banish from Salem the smoking evil among young girls was Wednesday promised by Chief of Police Frank Minto. An order will be issued immediately to all officers of the city, not only to check on young women found smoking in restaurants and other public places, but to watch the activities of merchants who have stores near school houses.

"It would be better—and far less embarrassing to a number of young women—if they were to understand that I and my department mean business in this matter," Chief Minto said. "I might explain that I, personally, dislike to see girls smoking and that I intend to see this thing through. I mean exactly what I say."

Tuesday it was explained by Mrs. Henry Giese that her store, located near the Parrish junior high, had found it necessary to discontinue selling cigarettes because not only young boys, but very young girls, were in frequently to purchase them.

It was explained by the district attorney's office Wednesday that it is unlawful for any minor—which means a girl under 18 and a boy under 21—either to smoke or possess cigarettes.

Many persons have commented on the fact that frequently young girls are to be found smoking in Salem.

CENTRAL RESERVE BANK FOR EUROPE

Berlin (AP)—Creation of a European Central Reserve Bank, conforming with the Federal Reserve Bank of the United States, is advocated by Leonard Keesing, former head of the foreign department of Kuhn, Loeb & Co., as a foundation upon which to build international understanding, good will and peace.

Mr. Keesing explained to The Associated Press that central banks of participating gold countries would deposit 10 per cent of their gold reserves in the central reserve bank and be permitted to include their balances with the bank in their own reserves. As American banks now do, they would also use the bank as a discounting institution for member banks only, each member guaranteeing payment of bills so discounted by it at the gold parity of the currency in which they are expressed.

BEVENS WILL BE PROBED BY GRAND JURY

W. E. Bevens, accused of obtaining money under false pretenses was bound over to the grand jury Wednesday after a hearing before Judge Braxler Small. Bail was fixed at \$2500 which Bevens failed to furnish.

Bevens was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Sam Burkhardt recently after a still hunt of more than three days. The accused operated a hopyard near here on leased ground. He contracted his crop to the Wolf Hop company, who advanced Bevens money after taking a mortgage on the growing hops. Shortly after, according to the complaint, Bevens approached Clifford Brown and arranged for the contracting of the same crop without telling Brown that the hops were already mortgaged. Brown advanced Bevens \$1000 in cash and about \$250 in materials. After these two transactions Bevens is accused of borrowing something like \$600 on the crop he had already contracted to deliver twice.

Bevens disappeared shortly after a warrant for his arrest had been sworn to and although he had been located several times since, he always managed to escape the officers. He was eventually arrested on a farm in the Astoria bottom where he was cutting wood.

CHICAGO NOT SO BAD AS PAINTED SABATH STATES

Washington (AP)—Agreeing that there is "a certain amount of crime" in Chicago, Representative Sabath, democrat of Illinois, contended there actually is less law violation per capita in that city and the state of Illinois than in the southern states "that have sent the leading and most obnoxious dry advocates to congress."

In an extension of remarks in the congressional record, Sabath, a wet, cited government figures showing that in 1928 there were 10 times as many distilleries, three times as many stills, five times as many forgers and more than twice the number of gallons of mash seized in Alabama, Florida, and Georgia combined than in Illinois. The three states, he said, have a population 200,000 under that of his state.

"And this notwithstanding that the laws are not enforced in these dry states to the extent that they are in my state," he added.

"I admit that we have a certain amount of crime in Chicago," he declared, "but what is the community or the city that has not more crime in Chicago in proportion to its enormous population than in any other city or section of the United States?"

Surviving children are Mrs. Minnie Johnson, R. B. E. John, Lee, Homer, and Mildred Cross, and Mrs. W. D. Edwards, all of Salem; Mrs. Maude York of Medford, Mrs. Edna Olsen of Portland, and James A. Cross of Ceres, Calif. Twenty-two grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, also survive.

Sarah Ellen Cochran was born in Montgomery county, Mo., May 21, 1860. She was married to William Ryla Cross, June 7, 1877 in Hood county, Texas. They came to Salem shortly afterward. Mrs. Cross was a member of the First Baptist church since 1878.

MULDON DROPS DEAD

Seattle (AP)—Pete Muldoon, widely known Seattle hockey promoter, died of a heart attack Wednesday while driving to Tacoma with Nate Drusman, his associate in the Seattle Hockey club, and Hugh M. Caldwell, former mayor of Seattle.

Tokyo (AP)—The emancipation of Japanese women has received new, semi-official recognition in the erection of an apartment house for unmarried women in a Tokyo suburb. The Japanese press refers to the place as "an old maid's paradise."

WARDEN TO QUIT IF MORE SPIES PLANTED IN PEN

Atlanta, Ga. (AP)—Continued "planting" of department of justice agents in the federal penitentiary here will result in Warden John Surick ending his resignation, he has informed Attorney General Mitchell in a letter forwarded to Washington three days ago.

The warden made known that he had written Attorney General Mitchell to this effect in denying Washington reports that he already had tendered his resignation.

In his letter the warden stated he told the attorney general that he was opposed to what he termed a system of placing agents in the prison as bona fide prisoners on falsified court orders, and added as yet he had received no reply.

"I cannot retain my self respect and remain in the service if this system of espionage is continued," the warden declared.
