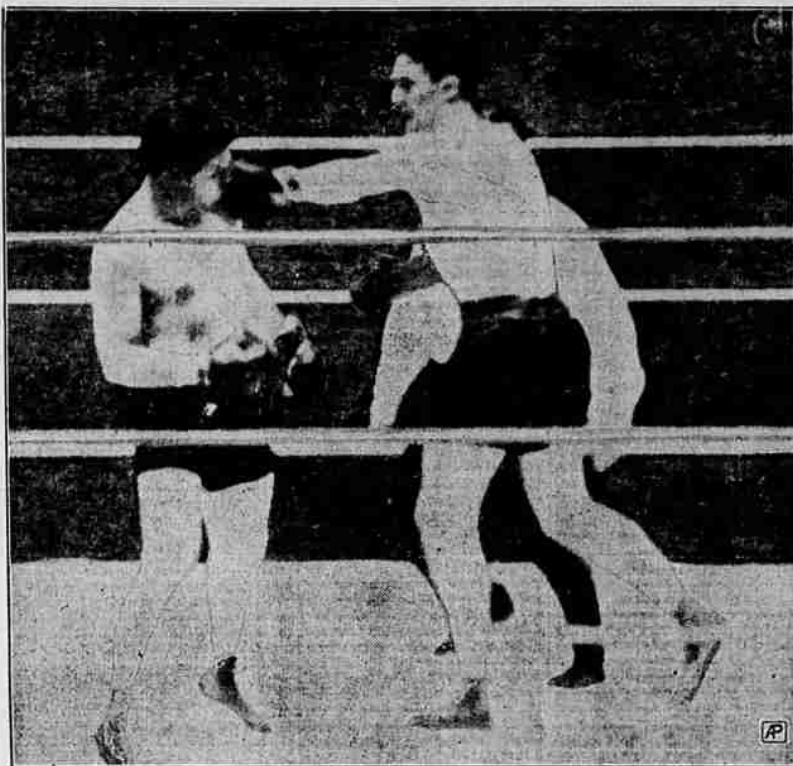

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Paddock Asks Clean Up For Amateur Union

New York (AP)—A new attack on the A. A. U. has been launched by Charlie Paddock, erstwhile "world's fastest human."

Speaking over the radio Sunday night, Paddock said the "removal of certain unprincipled characters hiding beneath the banner of the Amateur Athletic Union," together with the modification of the rules of that organization were needed to help amateur athletics in the United States.

"These rules and these characters," Paddock said, "have caused suspicion to be leveled against the A. A. U. from all sides and have brought into being a ridiculous condition of so-called amateurism that is distinctly un-American."

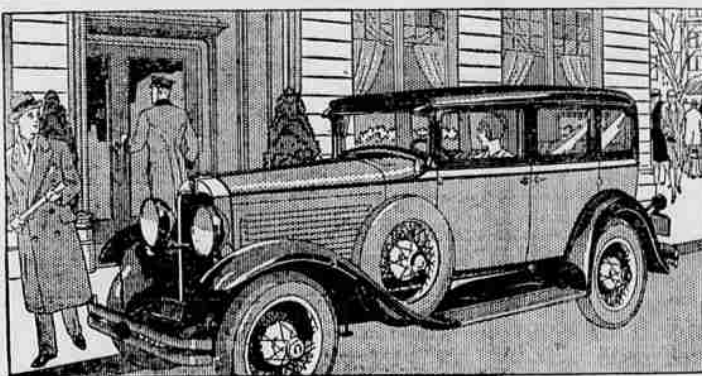
ACHE AND PAIN PARADE STARTS

Portland split the day's bill with the San Francisco Seals, taking the opening game 5 to 4 and losing the second clash, 5 to 0. The Seals and the Missions meet in the bay city this week.

Los Angeles took both ends of a double bill with Seattle to stay up with the leaders. The first contest saw the Angels hitting freely and winning 16 to 0; the second game score was 7 to 3. Hollywood and Los Angeles will cross bats this week.

Oakland and the Missions traded games, the Oaks winning 4 to 3 in the morning and the Missions finishing on the long end of the same score in the afternoon.

Million Trout Freed By Commission; Local Streams Get 243,000

The population of the deep pools and sparkling riffles of the streams of six Oregon counties has been increased nearly one million members of the finny tribe during the past two months, as the result of the activities of the Oregon State Game commission. To be exact, figures compiled by the commission, show that 967,000 fish have been planted from the Roaring River hatchery in streams of Marion, Polk, Benton, Linn, Lincoln and Clackamas counties. Most of the fish planted were eastern brook trout, although some streams were stocked with rainbow trout.

An experiment which will be watched with interest, by fishermen and members of the commission alike, has been started. Heretofore the fish released were very small but the plantings this spring will average close to five inches. It is believed a larger percentage of them will survive than had they been turned loose while younger. A few of the last truck load to be taken out were 14 inches in length, but the place where this load was planted has not been divulged.

The fish were raised under the supervision of Wade Ellis, who has charge of the Roaring River hatchery. They were carried to the various streams in an especially prepared tank truck. The water in the tank was constantly aerated through a pump connected with the truck's motor. When the truck arrived at the stream to be "planted," the front end of the tank was slightly tilted and the load of fish was placed in the stream through a long canvas hose.

Quite often when the fish were first liberated, they would swim about in a large school, but after several minutes of this would turn and move up-stream. Marion county received 243,000 fish, with Pudding river getting 74,000 in four separate plantings. The other streams planted were as follows: Abigau (two plantings), 30,000; Finney lake, 15,000; Salem lake, 18,000; Claggett creek, (two plantings), 22,000; Beaver creek, near Sublimity, 24,000; Stayton lake, 40,000; Little North Fork of Santiam, 20,000.

Linn county received the largest amount—373,500 in all. Thirteen fish were planted by a great many Thirteen fishermen were stocked with 55,000. Three different plantings made up this number. The other Linn county streams and number received follow: North Santiam, 38,000; Beaver, 74,000; McDowell, 38,000; Hamilton, 35,000; Tapper, 40,000; Calapooya, 20,000; Wiley, 20,000; Blythe, 15,000; Bernier, 15,000; Stud Horse slough, 8,500; Bear branch, 15,000.

Big Luckiamute river received 15,000 of the 53,500 released in Polk county streams. Horst Brothers lake received 25,500 and Rickreall river 12,000.

The fishermen in Clackamas county were favored with 142,000 members of the finny tribe divided as follows: Molalla river, 90,000, in five plantings; Woodcock creek, 15,000; Bull creek, 12,000 and Sandy river, 25,000.

Little Elk river received over half of the number sent into Lincoln county. Two plantings, totalling 20,000 fish were put into the Little Elk. Euchre creek received 12,500, balance, or 35,000.

Matt Ryckman, Portland, superintendent of hatcheries, is directly responsible for the raising and planting of the trout.

Albuquerque, N. M. (AP)—Mickey Walker and Tommy Loughran will fight a 45 round return bout at Agua Caliente, Mexico, May 29. Jack Kearns, Walker's manager, announced here. It will be the first 45 round championship bout since Nelson fought Wolgast in San Francisco in 1910.

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TRAPSHOOTERS WIN TWO OUT OF 3 MATCHES

Salem trapshooters won two of its matches and lost one in Sunday's contest in the Oregonian's telegraphic tournament. Scoring 73 out of a possible 75, the local trigger pullers beat Wasco and Helix and dropped the third to Heppner. Wasco was beaten 72-69, and Helix, 72-65. Heppner won out by one point, having a 73 score.

Five clubs went "straight" Sunday. They were Portland, Eugene, Bend, Nestucca and Corvallis. This leaves Bend and Corvallis still leading the percentage column.

The Salem shooters to figure in the scores sent in were Carl Bahlburg, Cuyler VanPatten and Hal DeSart. Each made a score of 24. But two more Sundays remain in the contest. Several clubs have one or more ties to shoot off.
