Some time after he located in Hubbard going into the hardware business. Mrs. Scholl died in 1923 and since then he made his home with his son George and family.

After his son George's death, some time later, he continued making his home there. He left three sons, Henry, Laurence and David, the former two of Hubbard, the latter of Cottage Grove. There are eight grand daughters and one grandson.

Miller of Aurora was in charge of the funeral and interment was in the Hubbard cemetery.
