

EIGHT TRANSPORTATION ROUTES ARE AVAILABLE

SILVERTON IS IN CENTER OF SCHOOL TRIPS

Silverton.—Because of the law passed by the last Oregon legislature, allowing high schools to furnish free transportation for pupils outside of their district, eight proposed routes for this purpose have been mapped out by the committee appointed and are as follows:

Includes Albiqua, McLaughlin and Evans Valley schools.

Includes Harmony and Thomas schools.

Includes Bethany, North Howell and Hazel Dell schools.

Includes Hazel Green, Central Howell and Brush Creek school.

Includes Huett, Bridge Creek, Silver Falls, Mountain View, Valley View and Silver Cliff schools.

Includes Porter and Ravis schools.

Includes Evergreen, Center View, Willard and Pratum schools.

Includes Victor Point, Oak Grove, Union Hill and McAleer schools.

The cost of transportation, roughly estimated is \$40 per pupil for the school year. There may be some changes in these routes as the school board plans to contract for these transportations and those getting contracts may find it handier to make this change.

Superintendent Robert Goetz states that Silverton is the second lowest in expense per pupil for high school maintenance in the county. The average cost per pupil here last year was \$94.70; Jefferson was the only school lower in this expense which was 86c less a pupil. Scotts Mills' rate was \$163.23 and Molalla \$182.28.

It may interest the taxpayers of Scotts Mills district, showing that they would save about \$30 per pupil by letting them attend here.

The committee which made out these routes are Superintendent Goetz, Charles Reynolds, George Steelhammer, George Hubbs and Dr. C. W. Keene.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION BEING SUPERVISED

SCIO PIONEER LAID TO REST CHURCH FRIDAY

Turner.—Funeral services were held from the Scio Baptist church Friday afternoon for Alexander Russell McDonald, Oregon pioneer of 1846, who died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. N. Long in Scio Wednesday morning. He was 84 years of age, and was born in Andrew county, Missouri on October 25, 1844. He came west with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. N. G. McDonald who crossed the plains by ox team, settling near Butte creek, Clackamas county. Two years later in 1848 the family moved to the Shelburn vicinity. In the year 1856 Mr. McDonald was united in marriage to Susan Wilford, and 12 children were born to this union, eight of whom survive their father. Mrs. McDonald died in 1917. Since 1866 McDonald had lived near Scio, and had been a member of the Baptist church there for 45 years.

Surviving children are Mrs. Lillian Mason, Eugene; Mrs. Margaret Hutchens, McMinnville; Mrs. Anna Fletcher, Hebo; Mrs. Alice Munsy, Albany; Mrs. Minnie Long, Scio; William F. McDonald, Redmond, Ore.; Ralph H. McDonald, Scio, and Roy McDonald of Newport. A brother, W. G. McDonald and three sisters, Mrs. V. A. McKnight, Mrs. Edwin Jones, and Mrs. W. A. Ewing, all of Scio survive, besides 45 grandchildren, and 19 great grandchildren.

Interment took place in the Miller cemetery near Shelburna. Floral offerings were beautiful and many, and several hundred people gathered to pay their last tribute of love.

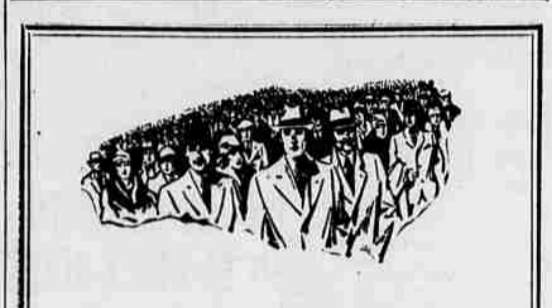
SILVERTON DECIDES ON CLEAN UP WEEK
