



Salem Will Observe Good Music Week With Full Schedule

On this occasion the people of Salem are asked to direct their attention to this subject and to foster the culture of music wherever and whenever possible.

Music week, the period from May 6 to 11, which has been set aside for nation-wide consciousness, participation, and appreciation of good music, will be observed in Salem with a full schedule of events.

A preamble to the Music week festivities which will begin Sunday, May 5, with a number of special concerts by church choirs, will be the program which will be given by the Choral Society. Daughters of the American Revolution Saturday afternoon, May 4, when they meet at Champey.

Monday night, May 6, the Salem MacDowell club will give a benefit concert at Waller hall on the Willamette university campus. Tuesday evening the Elks chorus, the American Legion auxiliary chorus and the Lyric chorus will appear in joint concert at the Grand theater.

An outstanding musical presentation of Wednesday evening, May 8, will be the ensemble concert by Willamette university musical groups in Waller hall. Thursday evening will be marked by two affairs—the concert at the blind school, and the graduating concert of Sacred Heart academy in St. Joseph's hall.

The high school senior chorus, under the direction of Miss Lena Belle Tartar, will present the comic opera, "H. M. S. Pinafore," at the Grand theater Friday evening. On the same evening a special music week concert will be given in the Y. M. C. auditorium and a concert will be offered at the state tuberculosis hospital.

Saturday afternoon the Girl Reserves of the Y. W. C. A. will give a pageant in Willson park and Saturday evening the Salem choral society of which Professor R. W. Hans Seitz is director, will present scenes from Longfellow's "Golden Legend" set to music by Dudley Buck in concert at the Grand theater. Elaborate preparations are being made for the Choral society presentation.

Mrs. Walter Denton who is both local music week chairman and state chairman, has announced a number of additional concerts during music week. The boys' industrial school, the Old Peoples' home, and the state hospital will be the locale of special programs. The Salem boys' and girls' bands, the Salem boys' chorus, the grade school chorus, and other musical organizations will contribute to the week's festivities.

Practically all of the rural districts in the county are planning special programs for the week. The "Golden Legend" which will be presented by the Choral society Saturday, May 11, is one of three parts of an elaborate poetical work entitled "Christus, a Mystery" written in 1831. It is based upon an ancient German poem, in ballad form, entitled "Der Arme Heinrich," by Hartmann von Aue. The vital idea, the attempted voluntary sacrifice of her life by a maiden in order to prolong the life of her prince, follows the medieval legend with little variation, but contains a wealth of description and a richness of style which are unknown to

the German poem. It conveys the old notion of the oldest of races, of the presence and activity in human affairs of a spirit of evil.

"The Divine Tragedy," preceding the "Golden Legend" in the poem although depicting Biblical scenes and characters of an earlier period, was not written until 1868. The third part of the poem, "The New England Tragedies," was written in 1872 and the entire work, bringing together the three parts, appeared as a whole in 1872.

The musical setting of "Scenes from the Golden Legend" dedicated to the poet by Dudley Buck was the prize composition of the Cincinnati musical festival of 1880, and is considered to be one of the composer's most beautiful works. In the realm of musical compositions it is classified as a symphonic cantata in fourteen scenes.

Solo characters represented are Elsie, soprano, to be sung by Mrs. H. H. Harms; Prince Henry of Hohenheim, tenor, by H. B. Glaisyer; Lucifer, baritone, by Albert H. Gilie; Friar Paul, basso, by Lawrence C. Maves. The ensemble parts will be sung by a chorus of forty-five voices, including ladies, men's and mixed chorus numbers. Rehearsals for the production are held every Monday evening at St. Paul's parish house.
