DELEGATES AT CONVENTION

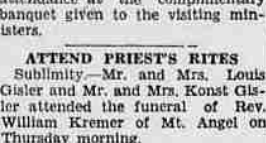

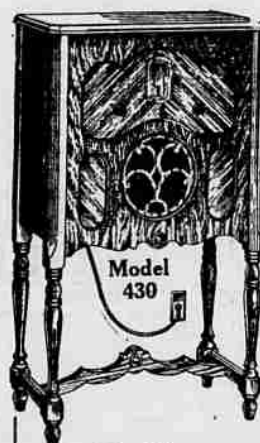
