All of the boys are students of the Turner high school, Chapman and Smith residing in Marion.

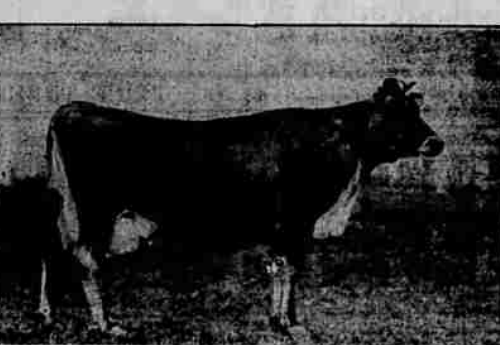
CLUB MEETING DRAWS

POLK JERSEY PRODUCES 1000 POUNDS BUTTERFAT



Imp. Xenia's Oxford Liliac, New Champion Imported Cow.

Independence—For the first time in history an imported Jersey cow has completed an official test record of more than 1,000 pounds of butterfat. The new record maker, Imported Xenia's Oxford Liliac, 674,105 is owned and was tested by Harry D. Iliff of Sunny Lea farm, Independence, Oregon. She has just finished a 365 day official test with a production record of 1,022.37 pounds of butterfat and 17,666 pounds of milk. This cow was bred on the Island of Jersey, the island near the coast of France, where this Jersey breed originated. She was purchased in 1923 by Mr. Iliff immediately after she had made the 7,000 mile journey across the Atlantic and the United States, and in that test she produced 821 pounds of butterfat, 13,122 pounds of milk in 365 days with calf. Xenia's Oxford Liliac is not only the highest record imported cow, but she is also the 22nd Jersey in the United States to produce over 1,000 pounds of butterfat, or 1,176 pounds of butter, in one year.

Her daughter, The Lion's Liliac 671,092, also owned by Mr. Iliff, is now on official test and is making such a high production record that it is probable that she, too, will produce more than a thousand pounds of butterfat in 365 days. In this event, Xenia's Oxford Liliac and her daughter will be the only dam and daughter in the Jersey breed to both exceed 1,000 pounds of butterfat on official test. The Lion's Liliac in a previous test of 365 days started when she was one year and nine months of age established a new world's record for cows of all breeds for that age class. With her yield of 742 pounds of butterfat and 10,752 pounds of milk she won the first medal of merit ever presented to a yearling cow by the American Jersey Cattle club.

Mr. Iliff owns two other Jersey cows that have produced more than 1,000 pounds of butterfat in an official test. These two cows are the new 1,000 pound producer, Xenia's Oxford Liliac, by their record give Mr. Iliff the honor of being the only breeder with three Jersey cows in the 1,000 pound class in his herd. Mr. Iliff's Jersey herd rarely numbers more than a dozen cows but these cows are such high producers that they hold both national and state championships in several age classes as well as many other notable honors.

Old Indian Fighter Is Yet Active

Selo—"Indians and wild game still had undisputed sway in the section of country now known as the Selo territory when I first saw the country," remarked James M. Griffith, of Logan, Ore., a few days ago in Selo.

Despite his 90 years, Griffith was making the journey on horseback from Logan, near Oregon City, to Eugene, where he has real estate interests. In the early 40s he first set foot on Oregon territory, and has been a resident of the state almost continuously since, according to statements made to Selo friends. Brownville was the first stopping place of the family, and later they located at Oregon City.

"Clackamas and Santiam Indians objected to giving up the Williamette valley to the pale-face brother, who would destroy their ponies' grazing lands with the plow and cut down the numbers of deer and elk with the rifle," Griffith said, as he reminisced on the days of the old frontier. "Swap salmon, swap shirt," was common lore in those days, and Indians were partially clothed and the white men partially fed on fish when they could get together on trades.

Griffith was an expert horseman and a "top hand" with cattle on the range and on the trail, it became known during his visit in Selo a few days ago. He still bore much the appearance of the typical frontiersman—long hair, Angora chaps, coiled rope attached to his saddle. He was promiscuously modern in one respect only—a cigarette stuffed into an amber holder. He was the guest of George Blyen while in Selo.

Griffith's coat lapel was bedecked with medals of the civil war, Indian wars, the Oregon Grange and the American Legion.
