CLOSURE THREATENS WASHINGTON PARKS

Olympia, Wash. (AP) — Thirteen state parks will be closed to the public this summer unless reputable concessionaires contract with the state for their upkeep in return for concessions or community funds are spent to keep them open.

Recommendations for the closing of the parks were made to the park committee yesterday by Harry A. Young, parks superintendent, and were tentatively accepted by the committee.

Young resigned as superintendent of state parks as of April 1 and arranged with the committee to keep five of the most popular parks open for the next two summers in return for fees collected from concessions.

Closing of the parks and the resignation of Young were due to the veto by Governor Roland H. Harris of the \$250,000 appropriation for maintenance of the park system, leaving no funds to operate the parks.
