

SENIOR CLASS PLAY VENTURE GIVEN PRAISE

Woodburn—The senior class of Woodburn high school deserves great praise for the manner in which it put over Shakespeare's "Merchant of Venice," Friday and Saturday nights, a feat seldom if ever attempted by high school students. The project was undertaken, after much deliberation, in the belief that high school students could put it over and the results justified all expectations.

Splendid cooperation by the entire class was one of the important factors in the success of the undertaking. Costumes were gorgeous and the stage settings the most elaborate ever seen in Woodburn. While the costumes for the principals were rented from Portland costume houses, those of the minor characters were designed by Mrs. Maude Mochel and made under her direction by a group of high school girls.

Properties were secured from the Beaman studios at Portland, the Elsinore at Salem, Roy E. Smith of Salem and from many homes in Woodburn, some of which were rare heirlooms. The total proceeds amounted to \$235, which will pay all expenses and enable the class to present a gift of a flood light to the school.

Each member of the cast deserves the highest praise for their performances and the perfection of their lines. Archibald Atkinson as Shylock deserves special mention for his splendid interpretation, and Sophie Pardy as Portia was also especially good. Stanley Stark as Bassanio and Ladew Moshberger as Antonio carried out their parts well as did all members of the cast. The production was under the direction of Miss Virginia Mason and Mrs. Maude Mochel, with Warner Guiza as stage manager. Many people from Salem and other cities were present at both performances.
