

MUSIC WEEK AT HUBBARD OPENS WITH PROGRAM

Hubbard—The music composition given under the direction of Dr. A. F. de Lespinasse at the city hall Sunday afternoon proved most successful, as a packed house greeted those taking part. This was the first of the national good music week program.

The concert opened with band selections, "America Inevitable" and "The Gypsy Festival". This was followed by a talk by Father Jonas of the local Catholic church. His topic, "The Value of Music in Church Work" brought out many interesting points; the choir of his Hubbard and Canby churches combined in the singing of the Credo in Latin and with organ and violin accompaniment this number stood out in contrast to the balance of the vocal program.
