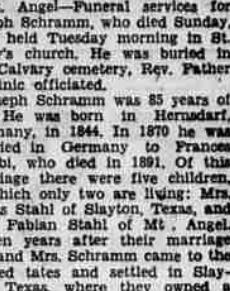
FORMER JEFFERSON BOY SAILS FOR CHINA

VISITING WITH PARENTS

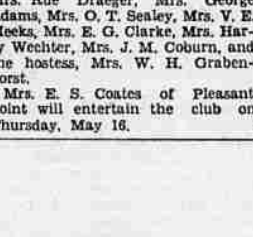
