AURORA CLUB GIVEN PAIR MILL STONES

Aurora—The Hurst Estate has presented the Community club with a pair of mill stones at one time used in the old colony flour mill on their property just north of Aurora. The two stones used in grinding flour at Aurora during colony times have been moved to the city lots on Main street. These stones are made of granite blocks, about five feet in diameter and 10 and 12 inches thick. They were brought from France in the early 40's. July, 1856, the flour mill was purchased by William Keil and these stones ground out flour for the colonists and nearby settlers. For many years they have been buried, but a short time ago they were unearthed.

The Community club at its last meeting made arrangements to have them moved to a place where they could be seen by those visiting Aurora. These stones are a curiosity and undoubtedly will be an attraction to many passers-by and to the home people.
