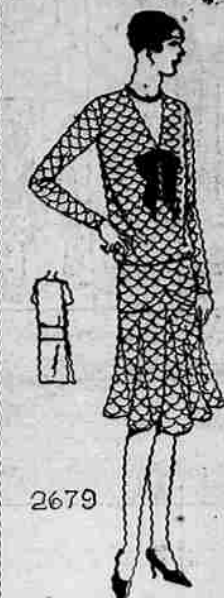

Programs Close 1929 Music Week

As the closing concert of national Music Week, observed throughout the United States, May 5 to 11, the Salem Choral society presented "The Golden Legend," an elaborate symphonic cantata in 14 scenes. Saturday evening at the Grand Theater.

The poem, "The Golden Legend," was written by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow and set to music by Dudley Buck. The vital idea of the old German poem upon which the entire production is based, the attempted voluntary sacrifice of her life by a maiden in order to prolong the life of her prince, follows the medieval legend with little variation, but contains a wealth of description and a richness of style which are unknown in the old poem. The musical setting was dedicated to Longfellow by Dudley Buck and was the prize composition of the Cincinnati musical festival of 1880 and is considered to be one of the composer's most beautiful works.

The cantata was directed by R. W. Hana, Soloists with Marguerite Blumberg Dalton as accompanist. The program included women's, men's and mixed chorus numbers in addition to the solo parts represented and sung by the following: solo, soprano, Mrs. Harry Harris; Prince Henry of Hohenack, tenor, B. B. Claisner; Lucifer, baritone, Albert H. Gillet; Friar Paul, basso, Lawrence C. Mayes.

A second feature of the final evening of Music Week was the concert presented at the Elsinore theater by the Schuberts, directed by Miss Minnie Mayers.

In Friday evening the advanced chorus classes and orchestra of Salem high school presented Gilbert and Sullivan's popular opera, "H. M. S. Pinafore" at the Grand Theater before a near-capacity audience.

The production, which was one of the finest ever given here by a high school group, was directed by Miss Lena Belle Tartar, head of the high school music department, and marked the final presentation of the music department for the year.

Outstanding characterizations were given by Miss Bernice Rickman, soprano; who sang the part of Josephine, the captain's daughter; Kenneth Abbott, basso, who carried the role of the Rev. Mr. Joseph Porter, J. C. B.; Miss Ruth Howe, as little Buttercup; and Homer Smith, who took the part of Captain Corcoran.
