Hubbard—The last of the programs of national good music week was given Saturday evening at the city hall. The following program was presented to an appreciative audience:

Wednesday evening a straight band concert with assisting soloists Thursday evening a junior concert evening by the beginning band and musical organizations of the Hubbard schools assisted by junior soloists. AUSTRALIA TO SEEK AMERICAN TOURISTS

Sidney, Australia. (P)—Australian business interests have started a \$500,000 publicity scheme to attract Americans, South Americans and Europeans to visit this country. C. H. Holmes, chairman of the Victorian railways betterment and publicity board, who is the promoter of the advertising campaign, sets great store on the attraction to Australia of tourists from the United States. He thinks that 10 per cent of them remain here.

In an article in the Melbourne Herald, Mr. Holmes says visitors from the United States have applauded the sunshine and our "great outdoors"—bushlands and golden beaches—and been amazed at the vast natural resources. He continues that one of the chief aims of the new organization is to attract investors, investor-settlers and tourists from the United States, and quotes a recent American visitor as saying:

"The average American thinks of Australia as a small island, and does not believe that it is bigger than the United States. It is never heard of in America, although it is distant only 23 days of comfortable travel."

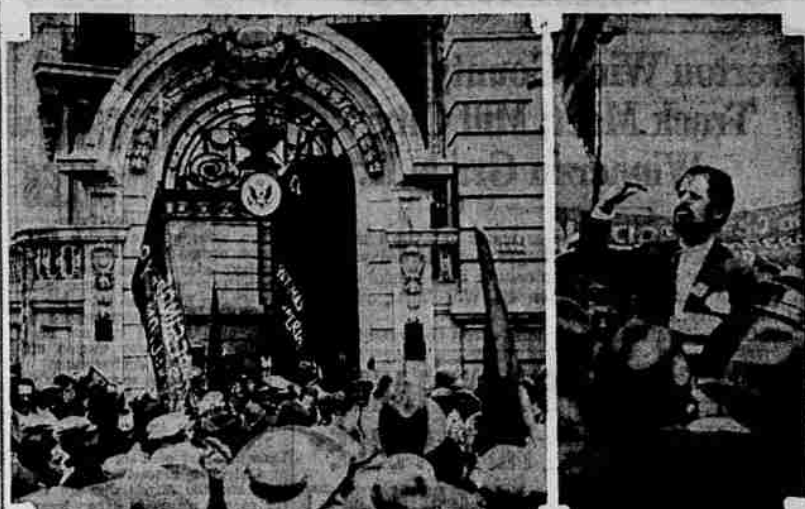

JAPANESE ART PUPILS WAGING BITTER STRIFE

Paris (P)—There is a Japanese "civil war" being waged right in the heart of the Paris "Latin Quarter" with canvas as the battleground and brushes as the weapons. It is providing the only real movement that the Quarter has seen for several years, for otherwise the famous colony of art-inclined Bohemians has been, for long already, in the doldrums.

The small army of Japanese painters is almost equally divided, but the most famous are all followers of Tsuguharu Foujita, most successful financially and artistically of all artists within the Quarter today. The civil war is waged around the question of holding to the Japanese tradition of art, or of modernizing it by healthy injections of modernism, cubism, impressionism and all the other "isms" with which the Quarter swarms.

Foujita has proven that it is possible, and even profitable, to mix French with Japanese ideas of art. But there are die-hard, sent to France on government fellowships who still contend that are is and fans is the only picture worth looking at.

The Japanese population of the cosmopolitan quarter is greater than the American. In Japan, whenever youth shows some aptitude for painting he is encouraged to go to Paris, for even in the Orient the prestige of the Quarter is recognized.

ADAMS' HOME AFTER MIDDLE WEST TRIP

NEW BRIDGE HELD SYMBOL OF UNION

Washington (P)—A dream for years—the symbol of a united nation is rapidly nearing completion in the nation's capital.

It is the Arlington memorial bridge across the Potomac river, extending from a point opposite the Lincoln memorial on the Washington side to the Lee mansion on the Virginia side. When completed it will be one of the most superb structures of its kind in the world.

The bridge will have nine arches with a draw in the center for the passage of vessels. It is of concrete with granite used for facing. Its length is 2,138 feet, with a roadway 90 feet wide, bordered on each side by sidewalks 15 feet wide.

The architecture is simple and of perfect proportion. At both the Washington and Virginia ends, pylons 40 feet high, surmounted by American eagles and adorned on the sides with sculpture and inscriptions, will be placed.

The sculpture on the side of the pylons represents the recognition of the common bonds and aspirations of the nation, and the final complete union. The figures on each end of the piers symbolize the harmonious union in the arts of peace—in inventions and accomplishments of art and science connected with the history of this country. And the idea of union will be evident to all at a glance.
