

SALEM DROPS FIRST GAME OF SEASON TO MT. SCOTT

EDWARDS FILES PROTEST; SAX CAUSE OF ROW

Playing under protest after the seventh inning, the Salem Senators lost their first start of the season in the Oregon-Washington baseball league Sunday afternoon at Olinger field, 2 to 1, Mt. Scott of Portland. Although Sax, the Mt. Scott hurler, wavered during the last few innings, for the most part he had the locals helpless. They got but three hits off his offerings during the entire game. Cole, for the Senators, was not so fortunate, for he allowed 10 safe blows. He seemed to delight in putting himself in a hole and on four occasions let the first man up get to first in one manner or another.

However, the Senators played remarkable ball considering the fact Sunday's game was the first time they had ever played together. With a little more batting practice, they will come out on the winning end of the score on numerous occasions before the season ends.

The new field is a vast improvement over old Oxford park. The stand is much larger, (although the seats are uncomfortable) and the entire layout is much more conducive to baseball. That long outer field, however, would break the heart of a Ruth or a Gehrig, for the batter simply has to knock 'em for about two blocks to get a circuit out of it. There are no fences to loft the ball over. Several of the smashes in Sunday's game would have gone for four bags at the old park.

Mt. Scott was the first to score. T. Girod got a single into center, was sacrificed to second when P. Girod went out unassisted to Fleichman. Calkins fanned and then Helmske secured a single into center, scoring T. Girod.

The Tigers pushed over another run in their half of the sixth. Buzzell hit a long one to left field for two bases. L. Girod brought him home with a smash through center. They threatened again in the eighth. After two were out, Bueno singled. Sax got his second hit of the game and Bueno went to second. T. Girod secured a pass to first, the bases being loaded. P. Girod then popped out to Ridings.

Up to the seventh the Senators had gotten but two hits off Sax, one by Cloninger in the second and another by Lamb, a mighty clout down the right field line, in the fifth. Ridings was walked to first in the seventh. Cloninger then lifted one to Bueno in left field. Pillette reached third and Gribble first when Sax overthrew the initial sack, but Gribble was caught at second trying to make two bases out of the error. Lamb was walked and stole second. Edwards came to bat and hit one to P. Girod for the third out.

The protested play came in the eighth. During the game Edwards had protested the way Sax was standing while pitching and the latter had been warned by both umpires. Cole had been walked to first. Goleman came to bat in the eighth and hit the first pitched ball for a single. He was called back however, when Umpire Mason said he had called time out previous to the pitch by Sax. Goleman then sacrificed Cole to second. The latter went on to third and Fleichman reached first when T. Girod let the first baseman high fly go through his hands. T. Girod's throw to third was too late to catch Cole. The big Senator hurler was then tagged out by Calkins on the old hidden ball stunt.

The players in the outfield made some remarkable catches of long flies, especially Buzzell in right field.

Despite intermittent showers a fair sized crowd attended the game. Next Sunday the Senators go to Albany where they will meet Rupert's Alcos.

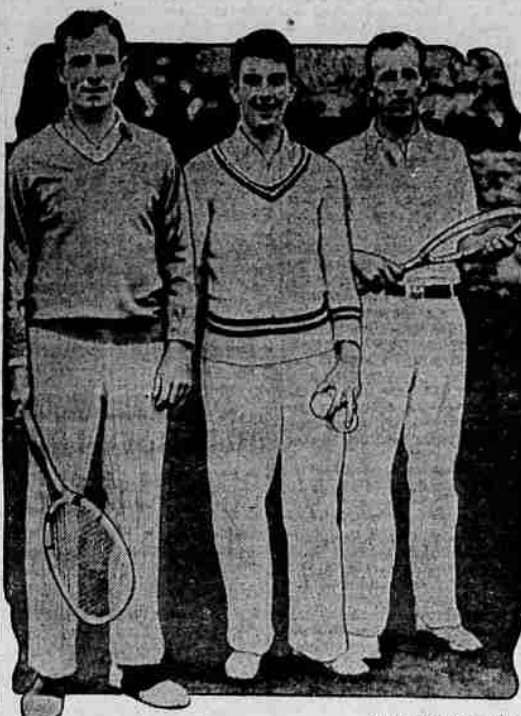

COLLETT TAKES FIRST MATCH AT ST. ANDREWS

St. Andrews, Scotland, (AP)—Glen-na Collett, American title-holder, began her quest for the British Women's golf championship with a five and three victory over Marjorie White of Southampton, in a first round match Monday.

Marion Turpie, born at St. Andrews but an American resident since she was less than a year old, was beaten in the first round by Miss S. P. Dampney, of England, three and two.

Most feared among the four American entrants, Miss Collett played a sterling brand of golf to down her first British opponent in decisive fashion. She took the lead at the first hole and never relinquished it. At the turn she was leading two up.

Perfect weather conditions greeted the American champion in strong contrast to conditions a year ago when cold and rainy weather partially accounted for her defeat in an early round by Mabel Wroeg. Miss Collett was first of the Americans to begin the hunt for a title that thus far has eluded the best efforts of the feminine stars the United States has sent over to Great Britain.

PORTLAND WINS 2 GAMES FROM LOS ANGELES

 Two clubs of the Pacific coast league occupied the limelight in Sunday's play among the eight teams. They were the league leading Mission Reds who twice in the day defeated the Sacramento Senators, and the last but not least Seattle Indians, who walked off with the Sunday doubleheader.

Oakland's Acons scored a double victory over the Hollywood Stars, and the Portland Ducks twice defeated the Los Angeles boys.

The games won by the Mission Reds put that club six wins ahead of their two nearest rivals, the Oaks and the Angels who are tied for second place in the league standings.

In the morning game the Reds won 10 to 4, while in the afternoon game they improved the score making it 11 to 2. The two wins left the Missions a clean sweep on the week's work giving the Reds 7, and the Senators a goose egg.

The two Seattle-San Francisco games provided a thrilling finish to the week's series. The Indians from the north won the morning encounter 4 to 1, and the afternoon affair 9 to 6. However, the Sea's won the series 4 out of 7.

Oakland won 4 to 2 in the morning and 6 to 5 in the afternoon from the Hollywood Stars, to make it six victories out of seven for the week.

Portland took the first game from the Angels 6 to 5, and the second 5 to 6. Los Angeles won the series 4 to 3. The Ducks took 8 hits off Boehler and Miller, and piled up their six runs in four innings to win the morning affair. The Ducks opened the afternoon contest with a five run rally. Nick Boerell scored a homer with two on base as a feature. The game went only six innings to allow Portland to catch a train.
