

DIOXIDE GAS CAUSES DEATHS CLINIC BLAST

Cleveland (AP)—Nitrogen dioxide fumed from the decomposition of the nitrocellulose X-ray films caused the deaths of the 124 men and women in the Cleveland clinic disaster last Wednesday. Dr. William E. Tower, co-founder of the clinic and one of its directors declared late Monday.

"This was the first official statement to come from a director of the clinic regarding the actual cause of the deaths.

The burning film generated sufficient poison to kill four million people, federal investigators said. They were cooperating with state and local agencies in learning the properties of the deadly gas, and the means of averting similar calamities.

Meanwhile, hospital and surgical centers within a radius of 1,000 miles had received hurried calls for "oxygen tents" for use in treating the remaining victims. Thirty-six persons were in hospitals Monday. Five of them seriously injured and of these two were expected to die at any time, physicians said.

AIRPORT AREA IS INCREASED

The area of the Salem airport will be increased from 130 acres to over 200 acres and it will be given a class A rating as a result of authority granted the airport committee by the city council Monday night to purchase an additional 96.41 acres.

The cost of the additional tract will be \$15,461. A 60-acre tract to be bought from Thomas W. Holman for \$10,000 and 36.41 acres from J. R. Linn for \$5,461.50. The airport committee paid the state \$60 an acre for the tract south of the state penitentiary.

A regulation length of runways will be provided with the additional land, with runway being at least 3,000 feet, according to members of the committee. R. D. Cooper, engineer, is now preparing plans for the runways.
