

OLD VETERANS ARE MISSED AT HUBBARD EVENT

Hubbard—For the first time since the first anniversary Memorial day, the stage was devoid of any members of the G. A. R. Byron Grim, well known as one of the few Civil War veterans in this district, was unable to take charge of the program as he has done in previous years and George Wolfer did not feel strong enough to take his usual chair on the stage though he was present in the hall. A Spanish war veteran, H. McArthur, was chairman of the program.

The line of march to the city building, the colors being carried by Clark Will, a veteran of the World war and Clyde Almsworth, a veteran of the Spanish American. Then the community band, under the direction of Dr. A. F. de Lespinasse, followed by members of General Relief corps, and other fraternal organizations.

Justice Gordon E. Hayes of Oregon City was the main speaker of the day, his theme being "citizenship." Miss Wilma Dick gave an essay upon the same topic. The invocation was given by Rev. J. W. Brantner and a drill and song was presented by the 5th and 6th grades under the direction of Mrs. Lottie Fry, teacher of those grades.

Vocal numbers were given by Mrs. Ivan Stewart, who sang a sacred number, "God shall wipe away all tears," and Mrs. Ella Stauffer and Mrs. Sadie Schell in a duet, "The Brave are Sleeping." They were accompanied by Miss Anita Bevens. Miss Marion McKenzie accompanied by her mother, sang "Sweet and Low." The band gave a number of selections.

At the cemetery the Relief corps was in charge of the usual concluding ceremonies. They were assisted by the Camp Fire girls, Group Adah. The Gettysburg address was given by Miss Gunadene Ridgwood, a member of the camp.

The flags, recently purchased by the business men of the city and by the Women's Relief corps, were set out for the first time since their purchase. The line of march from the city hall was changed so that the streets having the patriotic decorations were passed through instead of the streets on the further side of the track.
