ing that there was nothing intentionally prejudicial in it, and the latter declared the supreme court was without authority to prepare a substitute title. To hold against the ballot title, they said, would defeat the will of the people, because it would be impossible to circulate and file new petitions by June 4, the final date allowed by law for filing referendum petitions.

Thomas G. Ryan of Portland, who invoked the referendum on the excise tax, filed his preliminary petitions Friday. If the petitions are completed the measure will be voted on at a special election June 28.

Appeal from the attorney general's ballot title in the fraternal insurance initiative was argued by F. W. Hamilton, layman of Portland.

Minor of the measure, who told court he could not afford to employ a lawyer. He contended that the title should give the information that the law would not be operative unless an increase of over 10 per cent in rates was made by the insurance societies in any one year.

Attorney General Van Winkle and Milton R. Klepper defended the title.
