

SPRING VALLEY RESTING PLACE OF OLDTIMERS

Zona—With the cemetery in beautiful condition and the graves covered with flowers, Decoration day was again observed in the little churchyard here where so many of the Spring Valley pioneers are buried. The number of persons present at the memorial service was much smaller than usual, but an excellent program was heard.

Mrs. Marie Flint McCall of Bruah college, opened the services with the voluntary "One Sweetly Solenn Thought" and followed this with "March Romance" by Gounod. Wayne Henry, chairman of the trustees, presided at the meeting. "America" was sung in unison, and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Scott sang "I Love a Little Church House," accompanied by Mrs. McCall.

Ellis Purvine of Salem, secretary of the board of trustees, gave his report. He announced that a sum of \$2,550 is on hand for the maintenance of the cemetery. The trustees' resolution presented at this time to the effect that the principal be kept intact, using the interest for the upkeep of the cemetery was adopted and it was decided to have the Ladd & Bush Trust company of Salem hold the funds and to reinvest the sum when they deemed it advisable.

Mrs. W. D. Henry, chairman of the committee on church history for the Spring Valley Missionary society, announced that the society has started to gather data for a church history and asked that any who had clippings or photographs of historical interest loan them for the use of the society and promised that they would be well taken care of.

Guy O. Smith, attorney of Salem, was then introduced and gave an interesting talk. Mrs. J. S. Hlatt sang "America, the Beautiful" accompanied by Mrs. McCall, the entire group sang "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" and the exercises were closed by all repeating the Lord's prayer.

INJURED WOMAN IN SUIT FOR DAMAGES

Albany—John Dobesh and Marie Dobesh of Lebanon were made defendants in a damage suit for \$7,044.74 here in circuit court, filed by Mary Sheridan, for injuries alleged to have been sustained when the car in which she was riding as a guest of Mrs. Charles Spring was struck by the one driven Dobesh on the Lebanon-Solo road.

The plaintiff states that Dobesh was driving his car in "an imprudent, careless and negligent manner" and that it had poor brakes and that he was traveling at an excessive rate of speed at the crossroads where the collision occurred. Miss Sheridan claims that as the result of injuries received at that time she has lost \$1,000 a year as a trained nurse and has suffered general damages in the amount of \$5,000. The remainder of the claim is for money spent for professional services and medicines, necessitated by the accident. As the result of the accident the plaintiff asserts that she was thrown against the steering wheel of the car and sustained injuries to her arms and breast.

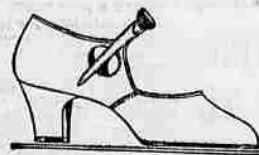

Unionvale—Mr. and Mrs. John Smith, who were ill several months, continue to gain. Their son, C. R. Smith, has been on the sick list.

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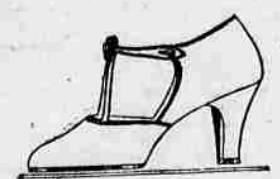


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
