

WOODBURN CITY COUNCIL TAKES OFFER ON LAND

Woodburn—The meeting of Woodburn's city council Tuesday night at the city hall was another chapter in the continued story of buying and selling real estate. Some progress was made however, and several pieces of property are on the way to redemption or disposal. An offer of J. R. Housewartz of \$250 for a quit-claim deed from the city on the two lots adjoining his residence property on the west was accepted and the Mayor and Recorder instructed to issue the deed.

A settlement was offered by the city in the Geer property for \$325.39 for a quit-claim of the city's interest if same is accepted before June 10th. The interest of the city in the McGuire property on East Lincoln street was offered for the amount of \$143.58 and interest and instructions were given for the issue of a quit-claim deed in this instance also. It was ordered upon motion that effectment proceedings be started on lots 3, 6, 7, and 8 in Chicago addition.

The construction of a cross-walk at the intersection of Fifth and Grant streets was ordered. The improvement of Sixth street was accepted by the street commissioner and ordered published.

W. F. Norman read his resignation as a member of the council on account of leaving the city and expressed his regret at the termination of the congenial relations which have existed in the work of handling the city affairs. Mayor Broyles expressed the deep regret of the council in the loss of Councilman Norman and the resignation was laid upon the table to be acted upon at the next meeting.

Bills for the month were approved by the finance committee and ordered paid. A bill of \$423, supreme court costs in the case of N. Miller, was laid upon the table for action at the next meeting.

DISSOLUTION OF UNION DISTRICT FINALLY VOTED

Albany—After many efforts, Crabtree union high school dissolutionists Tuesday evening won their battle to dissolve the district. They carried both district 109 and 110, which comprise the union district, on the face of unofficial returns. A majority vote in both districts is required by the law under which the election was held.

The result of district 110, however, was close, the dissolutionists winning by a scant majority of two votes, the tally being 50 to 58. In district 109 the vote was one-sided, the voters in favor of dissolution predominating by 28 to 6.

321 EIGHTH GRADERS PASS EXAMINATIONS
