

## PROF. BEATTIE TALKS AT SCIO COMMENCEMENT

Scio—In the youth of the land lies the hope of the world, according to Prof. W. G. Beattie of the University of Oregon, who addressed the Scio high school graduating class at the auditorium Wednesday evening.

"Youth's value to society cannot be easily overestimated," Beattie said, and he added that "society" may be home, the nation or the world. "Is moral laxity growing?" the speaker asked, proceeding to answer his own question to the extent of stating that conditions are "ever changing" and that society must adjust itself accordingly. Many of the problems of today may be solved through education and religion, Beattie declared. "Think through" conditions as they confront us, was the advice of the speaker.

A capacity house attended the graduation exercises and many were standing in the hall during the program. A storm of applause followed the awarding of the \$50 scholarship to Georgia Whitney, a member of the class. The scholarship may be used at any one of seven colleges in Oregon. Prof. Galliey paid the recipient a high compliment for her close application and her splendid achievements during the school year.

In a brief speech Mabel Long presented, on behalf of the class, a group picture of the 1929 graduates and also a picture of "The Covered Wagon," both of which now adorn the walls of the auditorium. Prof. Galliey, principal of the school, responded for the high school in well-chosen remarks.

## NEW AMERICAN PARIS EMBASSY IS NOW READY

Paris, (AP)—If frugal Benjamin Franklin could come back and see the palatial Embassy on the Seine banks overlooking Trocadero Park, which is waiting for the arrival of an occupant yet to be named by Washington, it probably would warp his Quaker conscience.

When Franklin opened the doors of the first American legation anywhere in the world, it was done under cover. The "Sage of Passy" even made an effort to keep the rest of the world from knowing that the 13 struggling American colonies had named a Minister to the court of Louis the Sixteenth. By pushing the door of the sitting room of his Passy cottage open, Franklin "opened" America's first Legation.

That was in 1777, and many things have happened since that time, many Ministers and Ambassadors have succeeded each other in Paris and all of them until Herrick complained bitterly about the slovenly quarters and offices they were obliged to occupy.

The late Ambassador Herrick solved the problem by buying a mansion belonging to the family of the former French President Grevy and then took a corner lot on the famous Place de la Concorde, the most expensive spot of ground in all France. Soon the American Embassy will rise there and the mansion will remain as the permanent home of Ambassadors.

The first Legation was a house in a suburb, the property of M. Ray de Chaumont and formerly the home of the lively and lovely Countess de Valentinois. It stood at the corner of the rue Basse and the rue des Vignes and took its name from the Countess, being known as the Hotel de Valentinois. The luxurious fetes she held in its

gardens are traditional, but when Franklin arrived there it quieted down.

Franklin lived in such costly fashion, though, even in that cottage that John Adams, when he came to share Franklin's home, complained about the old editor's fall from Yankee ideas of economy. Franklin kept a carriage and pair of horses, and his house was filled with servants.

## COLLEGE HEAD WARS AGAINST WORKING WAY

New Orleans, La. (AP)—"Don't work your way through college," is the advice of Robert Maynard Hutchins, 30-year-old president of Chicago university.

Most of the industrious boys who work their way through college, Hutchins declared in an interview here recently, fail to get a real college training.

A reporter remarked that Mr. Hutchins himself had worked his way through college. "Yes," he replied, "and I gained little education. I learned nearly all of what I gathered from college after I had been graduated and had become secretary of the Yale Law school."

"When one goes to college," he continued, "he should go with the sole purpose of getting an education. It is much better to stay away long enough to get sufficient money ahead, than to enter with the intention of putting part of his mind and time to making a living."

"And if a person goes with the intention of earning more money or

of raising his social standing he should stay away altogether. It is much less expensive to find social diversion in a country club."
