

SPRING VALLEY SOCIETY PLANS SUMMER PICNIC

Another song by Mrs. Utley, Billie, and Hilda closed the program.

Another interesting relic which Mrs. French had with her was a diary written by Sarah Adella Judson, the first item in which was recorded just 100 years to the day prior to this meeting, and later became Mrs. Leslie's who received the two letters read during the program.
