Some snow will probably be encountered in the upper reaches of the mountain. A particularly fine stand of timber is penetrated by this peak trail.

4 LOSE LIVES IN CLODBURST IN MONTANA

Wibaux, Mont. AP—Work of cleaning away debris and finding shelter for homeless families started today as flood waters from Beaver creek receded, leaving mud, rock and wreckage heaped in business houses and residences.

Wibaux bore the brunt of the clodburst that swept through this section yesterday. A wall of water 15 feet high at the crest, swept into the town carrying away more than a dozen houses, damaging scores of others, and drowning four persons. Property damage was estimated in excess of \$200,000.

The four who lost their lives were Rev. and Mrs. A. A. Siever, both 68, who were trapped in their home; Sever Knutson, 50, farmer, trapped in his home seven miles from here, and R. Thompson, 70, who was caught in his livery stable.

Water flowed through the town at depths ranging from eight to 15 feet. Business establishments were flooded and stock ruined.

Nearly 150 persons spent the night in a public school house after dodging west bound traffic from State street turning north and south into Commercial when turned loose.

But the travelling public suffered more or less patiently, if not silently in the interests of the experiment for an hour Thursday and half an hour Friday; drivers signaling for left turns through an unbroken and jumbled string of opposite moving traffic usually giving up in despair and continuing straight ahead under the prompting of the traffic officer to "keep moving."

At 5:30 Friday the "experiment" was called off, whether from despair or exhaustion of the officer, not being announced.

Significantly, the jam and confusion which had prevailed during the preceding half hour suddenly ironed itself out.

A survey of the other three intersections where it is proposed to install the automatic signals during the time when the experiment was being conducted at State and Commercial was revealing. At State and Liberty, where Officer Smart had been detailed to handle the "jam," the officer was unable to find the expected confusion and stood on the curb for an hour watching the cars swing merrily by.

At State and High streets and at Court and Liberty, where it is proposed to install two of the signals, there were neither cops nor confusion during the entire "rush" hour with motorists and pedestrians regulating their own movements.

PLAN LOYALTY SUNDAY JUNE 30

New York. (AP)—A proposal to proclaim Sunday, June 30, as Loyalty Sunday, dedicated to "The Hoover program of law enforcement," has been endorsed by Henry Ford and other influential individuals and groups.

The proposal with the list of signers was announced by Collier Ford, executive director of the religious information service of the Christian Herald association. It reads in part: "The American people have been summoned by President Hoover to pledge anew their loyalty to the laws of the land."

"We urge that Americans of whatever faith join on that day in a solemn resolution to observe the law, beginning that observance in their own homes and extending it, in so far as they are able through the communities in which they live."

A series of immunization clinics for pre-school children was opened by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, in Hubbard, Woodburn and Aurora Thursday. The clinics for the pre-school children will be offered at the Salem health center during the summer. Dr. Douglas will announce schedules later. Children under five years old are particularly susceptible to diphtheria, says Dr. Douglas and 90 percent of the children under five who contract diphtheria, die. For this reason special effort will be made to offer immunization against diphtheria to all of the very small children in the county as well as school children.

to be the confusion and delay resulting from traffic direction by automatic mechanical signals, when control exercised with human flexibility only increases congestion and confusion?

Officer Kuykendall was assigned to the traffic experiment at State and Commercial streets Thursday and Friday afternoons, starting his labors at 5 o'clock. Thursday he stayed on the job an hour while motorists tangled their cars up along both State and Commercial streets, and were at times jammed up from half a block to a block in single and double file.

Friday afternoon the experiment lasted only from 5 to 5:30.

Repeatedly cars were jammed in a line stretching north as far as Court street, and eastward half way to Liberty street.

Pedestrians held back in their north and south progress across the intersection to allow for the "controlled" flow of east and west traffic as effectively blocked when the signals were reversed for the flow of north and south bound cars and trucks making right and left hand turns into State street.

Likewise, east and west bound pedestrians found themselves dodging west bound traffic from State street turning north and south into Commercial when turned loose.

The experiment adequately demonstrated that "synchronized" movement of vehicular and pedestrian traffic at this intersection at least, where 95 percent of the traffic from State street turns either north or south into Commercial, and where fully 50 percent of the Commercial street traffic turns east into State, is not only going to be confusing and congesting but also dangerous.

SIMPSON WINS 100 YARD DASH IN RECORD TIME

Stags Field, Chicago, (AP)—George Simpson, Ohio state speedster established himself as the outstanding sprinter in the world Saturday when he won the 100 yard dash in the finals of the national collegiate track and field championships Saturday in 9.2-5 seconds, eclipsing all world's records.

Simpson clipped a fifth of a second off the officially recognized world's record of 9.6-10 seconds by his marvelous victory. He beat Claude Bracey, the Dixie flor of Rice Institute, Houston, to the tape by a step in a thrilling finish. Thundering back of them came Eddie Toland, sensational negro sprinter from the University of Michigan, with Cy Leland of Texas Christian fourth.

There were five watches timing Simpson's performance. Two caught him in 9.3-10 and three registered 9.4-10. Racing conditions were almost perfect for record dry and there was no breeze to favor the runners. The breeze at the time was blowing across the course.

Simpson came right back and won the 220-yard dash in a heart-breaking finish with Toland in 20.8 seconds, setting a new meet record. He clipped a tenth of a second off the N. C. A. record established by Roland Locke of the University of Nebraska in 1928.

TAFT IN HOSPITAL FROM OVERWORK

Washington, (AP)—Over-exertion on a recent trip to Cincinnati and gall bladder trouble have sent Chief Justice Taft to Garfield hospital here for rest and observation. Hospital authorities say he is in no danger. Drs. Francis R. Hagner and Thomas A. Clayton, his personal physicians, believe a complete rest for several days will enable him to recuperate.

The chief justice made a brief visit to relatives at Cincinnati after the close Monday of the arduous winter session of the supreme court. He returned yesterday en route to his summer home in Canada, and disaffected with his physical condition, he stopped for an examination and rest.

ATTORNEY GENERAL GOES TO BOSTON

Attorney General Van Winkle will go to Boston to attend a conference of state officials next week relative to a requested rehearing of the case of McCallum vs. Massachusetts, and also to intervene for the state of Oregon in the petition for rehearing of that case.

The McCallum case is one in which the Massachusetts supreme court held that the income from tax exempt securities is not assessable under an excise tax law. This has a bearing on the new Oregon excise tax act and it is said the decision would Oregon tax revenue by about \$100,000.
