HOUSE BACKS PRESIDENT BY 250-113 VOTE

Senate Plan of Export
Debentures Defeated
On First Roll Call

Paves Way for Recession
By Senate and Quick
Passage of Bill

Washington (AP)—In seven minutes without a word of discussion the house Thursday went through the motions of eliminating the debenture plan from the administration's farm bill and sent the bill back to conference with the senate by a vote of 113 for debenture to 250 against.

The strict rules of the house were invoked by republican leaders to shut off debate and prevent any expression of opinion regarding the debenture feature so strongly opposed by the house leaders and by President Hoover, although twice adopted by the senate.

When the house met at noon there was some minor business and then Chairman Haugen of the house agriculture committee moved that the house take up House bill No. 15, the famous farm bill.

"I don't want to take up any time with discussion of the debenture," he said.

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CENSUS BILL PASSES SENATE, UP TO HOOVER

Washington (AP)—The senate Thursday approved the census reapportionment bill and sent it to the White House the first of the major legislative proposals of the extra session.

By a vote of 48 to 37, the conference report adjusting differences with the house was adopted. The house previously had acted.

The bill was on the program of President Hoover for the extra session and his approval is expected by congressional leaders.

It would provide for automatic reapportionment of the house every ten years on the basis of the decennial census. The house has not been reapportioned since the 1910 census.

The measure authorizes the 1930 census to start next April 1. Employees for the census taking would be removed from civil service restrictions except for the special agents.

SUSPECT LOOKS LIKE TALLMAN

San Francisco (AP)—A flurry of excitement was created here Thursday when an unconscious man closely resembling William Tallman was brought to the central emergency hospital.

Nurses on duty, struck by the resemblance of the patient to published pictures of the radio operator sought in connection with the murder of Mrs. Virginia Patty in Los Angeles, notified police at once.

Detectives hurried to the hospital and reported the unconscious man's face resembled pictures of Tallman.

Finger prints were taken and telegraphed to Los Angeles with comparison of those of the radio operator which were found in the apartment where Mrs. Patty met death, and which later were identified as being the fingerprints of Tallman's fingers.

The man was brought in from an uptown apartment unconscious from gas.

Joseph Lanerin was the name under which the man has been registered at the apartment hotel at 691 Broadway. Nothing concerning him was known by the landlady.

RELIGIOUS WAR IN MEXICO ENDS, REPORT STATES

Mexico City, (AP)—Advices from Washington indicating that actual agreement had been reached here on the long standing Mexican religious controversy, and that communications asking papal sanction to the agreement had been forwarded to Rome, created a sensation here.

No official announcement was forthcoming but there was reason to believe that Wednesday's meeting of President Emilio Portes Gil and Roman Catholic prelates merely by climaxing long months of prior negotiations, in which the basis for settlement had been reached.

In well informed quarters here it was said this basis was mutual consent for a broad interpretation of the country's religious laws. Stringent enforcement of which in 1926 led to the Episcopate's order withdrawing priests from the churches such, it was pointed out, would involve concessions by both the Mexican government and the church, without either giving in unduly.

TARIFF REVISION TO BE GENERAL

Washington (AP)—The senate finance committee Thursday voted down a motion by Senator King, Democrat, Utah, that the committee confine its tariff revision to agricultural products. The vote, 11 to 7, against the motion, was strictly along party lines.

After rejecting the King motion, the committee received a proposal that agricultural products be placed on an ad valorem or percentage basis of tariff protection instead of specific. It was presented by Chester H. Gray, legislative representative of the American farm bureau federation, who said his recommendation represented a "complete reversal of policy."

On the part of agriculture as he argued, ad valorem duties had worked advantageously for other industries and he saw no reason why it should not be used for farm products.

PRINCE OF WALES NOT TO WED INGRID

London (AP)—The Daily Mail Thursday said an unnamed "high court official" had denied emphatically that there was a word of truth in reports linking the name of Princess Ingrid of Sweden with members of the English Royal family.

Reports published abroad that there might soon be an announcement of the engagement of the Swedish princess and the Prince of Wales, were said to be particularly vexatious to court circles.

NEGRESS GUEST AT WHITE HOUSE TEA

Washington (AP)—Mrs. Oscar De Priest, wife of the negro representative from Illinois, was entertained at tea Wednesday at the White House by Mrs. Hoover.

Others at the tea included Mrs. Good, wife of the secretary of war; Mrs. William D. Mitchell, wife of the attorney general; Mrs. Arthur M. Free, wife of the California congressman, and Miss Grace Burton, niece of the Ohio senator.

The late President Roosevelt, it was recalled, once entertained Booker T. Washington, the famous negro educator, at a White House luncheon.

Swarm of Bees Found on Owner's Grave

Durham, N. H. (AP)—The late Charles James, professor of chemistry at the University of New Hampshire, had 14 hives of bees. He cared for them personally. Recently a swarm disappeared. It was found on flowers on his grave.

ABDUCTORS OF KINNE ESCAPE MANHUNTERS

Nex Perce, Idaho (AP)—A. W. Mitchell, sheriff of Lewis county, reported Thursday after an all night search for bandits who robbed and abducted Lieutenant Governor W. B. Kinne, that he believed the fugitives were escaping down along the Clearwater river.

The four armed robbers had a car stolen from W. L. Tribbey, which bore Washington license number 245,060, but the sheriff advised the Associated Press that he believed they had another car parked in the timber. He expressed the opinion that the bandits were a coast outfit, probably operating from Seattle.

The manhunt in Lewis county began to subside Thursday, the searchers realizing that the robbers had probably made their way out of this territory.

Mitchell said that a report that he had arrested two suspects Wednesday was erroneous.

ASKS PROBE OF DRY ENFORCERS

Washington (AP)—Creation of a joint congressional committee to study methods of enforcing prohibition laws used by federal officials was asked in a resolution Thursday by Representative Schaefer, Republican, Wisconsin.

He proposed a \$25,000 appropriation to meet expenses. Schaefer has been active in denouncing recent shootings by federal officers in prohibition enforcement.

The measure declared the "extensive toll" of lives taken by federal agents had culminated in an "atrocious" at International Falls and "caused the citizens of the republic to be fearful that their lives may be snuffed out at any time they traverse the public highways."

DAVIS NOT RESIGNING

Washington (AP)—Widely published reports that Secretary Davis of the labor department would resign his post within a short time and be succeeded by Edward A. Filene, of Boston, are denied Thursday at the White House.

COPLEY DENIES OWNERSHIP OF POWER STOCK

Washington, (AP)—Ira C. Copley, publisher of California and Illinois newspapers, in a statement submitted to the federal trade commission today challenged Senator Norris of Nebraska to "repeat on the street as facts" his charges in congress that he was connected with public power utility interests.

Chairman McCulloch of the commission refused to let Copley either read the statement on the witness stand or to place it in the record. The chairman declared that witnesses were "not permitted to come to use this place as a forum for debate with any other person." He added that Copley could testify to anything he wishes about his case if it dealt with the record of the commission's investigation into publicity activities of public utilities.

MOTHER GOES TO PRISON TO AID CHILDREN

Fort Smith, Ark. (AP)—A 50 year old mother who pleaded guilty to a prohibition law violation that her husband might be freed to care for the 12 children Thursday made ready for her journey to the federal prison at Alderson, W. Va., and an imprisonment of 18 months.

Admitting responsibility for the liquor business which officers said they found on the couple's farm 30 miles north of here, Mrs. Joe Post heard her sentence and a \$100 fine with a qualm after similar charges against her husband had been dropped.

A leniency plea by defense counsel, who cited the woman's large family and her previous clear record, brought little sympathy from the bench. Judge Frank A. Youmans replied:

"It is too bad that Theodore Roosevelt is no longer living," he explained. His remark applied to the late president's fondness for large families and Mr. Roosevelt's sympathy for erring parents.

Mrs. Post is the mother of 18 children, four of whom are dead.

Three Shootings by Dry Agents Stir Up Indignant Protests

Washington (UP)—Three prohibition shootings within the week appear to have precipitated the first major liquor controversy of the Hoover administration. Coming suddenly and almost simultaneously, the three instances of gun play have brought demands on government authorities for safeguards against further shootings; members of congress, the American Automobile association and others are included in the list of sources criticizing the shootings or demanding a change in the enforcement situation as regards use of firearms by dry agents.

YELLOW BIRD ON WING BUT CRASH HALTS GREEN FLASH

Frenchmen Make Beautiful
Take Off at Old Orchard Beach

American Plane Swerves
Into Ground Loop and
Smashes Badly

Old Orchard, Maine (AP)—The Yellow Bird, Paris bound, had been unreported for more than three hours at 2:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

No fears were expressed for its safety, however, as when it passed over Matineus Rock light, 20 miles off the coast at Rockland, it was heading east which would carry it away from the coast and out of sight of land.

The plane covered the distance to Matineus, approximately 80 miles, in a little more than one hour.

Old Orchard, Maine (AP)—One of the two trans-Atlantic airplanes got away to a good start Thursday for Paris, but the second, destined for Rome, crashed before she left the ground.

The Yellow Bird, huge French monoplane, manned by a crew of three young Frenchmen, made a beautiful take-off at 10:08 a. m. and sped away to the east, accompanied by a coast guard amphibian.

The Green Flash, American plane, with an American crew, nosed over on the beach and swerved into a ground loop about midway of her run, which turned her nose directly about.

Lewis A. Yancey and Roger Q. Williams, of the American plane, were not injured.

The Green Flash nearly duplicated its accident of two weeks ago.

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
