Historic Relics Placed Friday Within Memorial Log Cabin At Champoege

Woodburn—The first annual memorial of the Daughters of the American Revolution will be held at Champoege on Friday afternoon, June 14, which is Flag day and ground will be broken for the erection of the log cabin which is to be built as a memorial to the pioneer mothers of Oregon. Mrs. Isaac Lee Patterson, chairman of the committee for the memorial, will be present. The first shovelful of dirt will be deposited in a Dutch oven, which was brought across the plains and used every day by the family of Daniel Smith in 1852 and was donated to the memorial building by Eugene Manning of Manning's Corners near Gervais, who is a grand son of the original owner. Many other interesting relics have been collected by Mrs. A. E. Austin of Woodburn, which will be used to furnish the cabin. Among these articles are three guns, one brought across the plains by Francis Manning and donated by his son, Eugene Manning; another brought across the plains in 1852 and donated by Caleb Simmons; a third brought across the plains in 1845 by Christopher Columbus Cooley and donated by his grandson, Rex Cooley. This one has powder horn and shot pouch. A chair that belonged to Robert Cooley is donated by his son Rex Cooley, and a brass kettle that belonged to the Hubbard family, after whom the town of Hubbard is named, was donated by a grandson, Rex Cooley. A large tea jar in which coffee was kept by the Major W. W. Walker family when they crossed the plains in 1848 was given by their daughter, Miss Dora Walker. Miss Walker also gave some old pictures. One of these which is attracting much attention is a seed wreath made by Susan Walker Jeffreys about 1870. Every seed and flower that could possibly be used is found in this remarkable "farmer's wreath." Another is made of feathers artistically arranged. The tea jar which Miss Walker donated is a beautiful piece of pottery and upon close examination quaint Chinese characters may be seen.

A clock which dates from 1899 has been donated from the home of S. W. R. Jones and a trundle bed from the Giesby home in the old Aurora colony has been donated by Mrs. Eugene Mosherberger of Woodburn.

Mrs. Susan Emma (Jones) Osborne of Champoege has donated a brass fender for the fireplace that came across the plains at an early date.

These articles have all been collected by Mrs. A. E. Austin of Woodburn, who is chemist's chapter chairman for the D. A. R. memorial log cabin. Mrs. Austin will be glad to interview any descendants of pioneers who wish to be represented in the memorial building, which when finished will be dedicated to the pioneer mothers of Oregon. All articles contributed will be suitably marked with the names of the original owners and the name of the donors and any interesting bits of history connected therewith.
