Dewey Bevier and Mrs. May Zachery were visitors at the W. E. Bevier home last week.

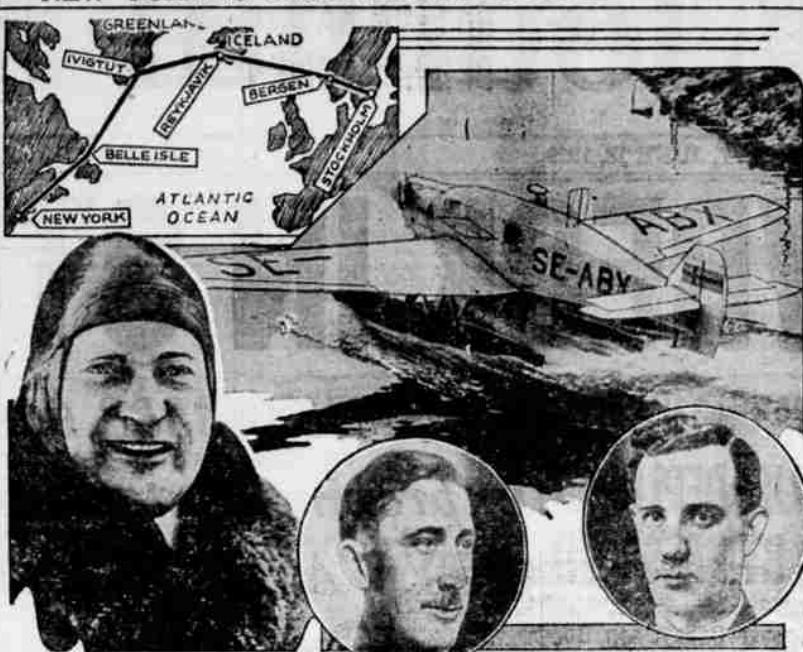
Wilma Goodwin is a victim of the mumps. This is the first case since the close of school.
