

MISHAPS TAKE HEAVY TOLL OF SCIO WORKERS

Scio—Tim Sweet, an employee of the Trolinger brothers, sustained a severe injury to his back while working in the timber. Bud Bass, also with the Trolingers, received two broken ribs.

Charley Curre was injured while working at the Holec & Yocubets mill near Scio, one of his legs being badly bruised. Gale Phillips, employee at the same mill, sustained a broken shoulder and elbow when a limb fell 50 feet on him.

George H. Miller of Marion county had a severe cut on the knee with an ax while working in the timber.

The men were attended by Dr. A. G. Prill of Scio and their cases come under the state compensation law.

Ralph Johnston has a lacerated face as a result of an accident Monday when he discharged a gun. The weapon seems to have "blown up" when the cartridge discharged. The gun was formerly a 22 calibre rifle but had been bored out for a 410 shotgun. Stitches were required to close wounds in Johnston's face. His eyes were not seriously injured.

While on the way to the Providence memorial services Tom Large's coupe collided with a heavier car with the result that both machines were considerably damaged. No one was seriously injured. It is understood the larger car was from Corvallis.

Wayne Phillips' closed car was damaged when he turned to the right to allow a car to pass from the rear and struck a stump near the grade. The accident occurred on the road between Scio and Jordan. No one was injured.

SCIO SCHOOL FINANCE GOOD

Scio—P. W. Schunk was unanimously elected to the three-year term of school director for district No. 95 at the annual school meeting in Scio Monday. Frank Bartu was elected for a term of two years. He was appointed last year to fill a vacancy. J. F. Wescely was elected clerk for one year, he having filled that position during the last year. He has served 15 years in that position. Fred Sturges is the retiring member of the board. The board now consists of W. Z. Sims, Frank Bartu and P. W. Schunk.

The financial statement presented by the clerk indicated that approximately \$12,000 was received from various sources for the support of the Scio school during the last school year. Expenditures exceeded this amount by \$3,155, as shown by outstanding warrants. Interest on district indebtedness amounted to about \$155 last year, the report showed.

On motion a committee of three was authorized to investigate the probable cost of repairing the gymnasium and placing it in condition for graduation exercises and other school activities and public gatherings. The committee's report and recommendations are to be presented to the budget committee with a view of having the amount recommended incorporated in the annual budget next fall.
