

FRONTIER DAYS TO BE REVIVED AT MOLALLA SOON

RODEO CLOWNS OFFER MIRTH DURING EVENT

Molalla—There are clowns of numerous types and varied ability in the field of rodeo fun making, who bob into the lime light at more or less frequent intervals, but the greatest arena comedian of them all is Ed Wright, who is justly characterized as the expert clown of rodeoland and who will bring thrills to the big buckaroo at Molalla July 2, 3 and 4.

Some clowns work with trick mules and some without, and many, far too many of the former class carry their entire fund of comedy between the ears of their long eared allies, so when the mule tires of its sack of stunts and becomes exhausted, the fun-making stops. Wright is well without this category, for while the star of laugh provokers has one of the most gifted trained mules in the game, in no sense does he depend upon his four-legged team mate in providing merriment to the grandstand.

Wright's antics in the arena are just as funny without as with his mules and have been known not infrequently to "stop the show." This star of rodeo comedians, in circus parlance, would be termed a "producing clown," for aside from being a natural fun maker, his ready wit, originality and resourcefulness in the arena invariably result in a rapid-fire of spontaneous comedy, that each year keeps the vast audiences at Cheyenne, Pendleton, Madison Square Garden, New York, and other nationally known cowboy rodeos of the nation. He has clowned Cheyenne for 13 continuous years and has worked with Ringling, Tex Austin and other rodeo producers.

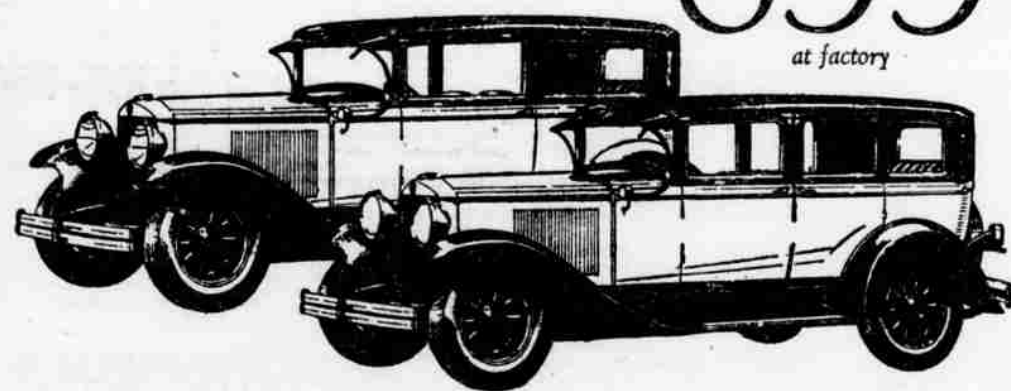
SERVICES SCHEDULED FOR BROOKS SUNDAY
