

SILVERTON WAR VETERAN DIES; RITES TUESDAY

Silverton—George Joseph Gordon, 41, died in the U. S. Veterans' hospital in Portland Saturday night at 11 o'clock, where he had been a patient for the last ten days. Gordon had been admitted to the hospital at various times during the last 18 months.

Funeral services will be held from the Rigdon mortuary in Salem Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock with interment in the American Legion plot in the Cityview cemetery. Members of Delbert Reeves post of the Silverton American Legion, will have charge of the funeral.

Gordon was born at Mullino Dec. 20, 1887 and spent his entire life in this district. He was married in Salem, April 16, 1918. The last five and one-half years were spent in Silverton. Besides his widow Myrtle Gordon, he is survived by three children, Kenneth L., of New Mexico; John B. and Thelma, of Silverton.

With the aid of pulleys and tackle, the horse was raised almost out of the well, when the weight, about 1600 pounds or more, broke the rope and the horse slid back in. A second attempt proved more successful, and the animal was finally hoisted from the hole, which had several feet of water, so that only the head of the horse was out when he was in an upright position. The diameter of the well was about three feet. Muelhaupt himself arrived in time to help, and in a day or two the animal seemed entirely all right again.
