

LEGION AERIAL CIRCUS TAKING CONCRETE FORM

Silverton—The different committees on the American Legion air circus, their third one to be held here on July 6 and 7, report everything about completed. Several concessions have been sold and a few more are pending.

There will be 25 or more commercial planes coming from various sections of Oregon and Washington; army ships from Pierion field at Vancouver; two Ford tri-motor ships—one from California. An attempt is being made to secure the General Tire and Rubber company's fleet of seven ships from Akron, Ohio. Each one of these planes has a neon letter on the bottom of the ship which spells the word "General" and makes a splendid showing in the sky. The Portland gliding club is also being interviewed with the intention of having them bring their glider which has no motor.

There will be races, stunts, parachute jumps and a balloon busting contest. The longest race will be 20 miles. In the balloon contest, each plane will have one large rubber balloon sent up and the pilot must break his balloon by nose diving. Charles A. Reynolds is general chairman of the circus. There were more than 10,000 people attending last year and more are expected this year.
