

# TILDEN CONTINUES HIS WINNING TENNIS PARADE

## BIG BILL WINS FROM BOUSSUS, STRAIGHT SETS

Wimbledon, England (AP)—Bill Tilden continued his parade through the English tennis championships at Wimbledon, defeating Christian Boussus, one of the French invaders, in straight sets, 6-3, 6-7, 6-4, Friday. As the Bill was downing the Frenchman, John Hennessey was forced to admit defeat at the hands of another Frenchman, Henri Cochet. The ace of the French Davis cup team, took the first two sets easily but was forced to play his best before annexing the third match, the score was 6-1, 6-4, 9-7.

## Schmeling Takes Bloody Battle From Spaniard; "Sweet Adeline" Annoys

New York (AP)—Just before the start of the 15th and last round of the slugfest between Max Schmeling and Paulino Uzcudun, referee Arthur Donovan looked anxiously at the bloody, battered face of the Spaniard and asked:

"Are you all right, can you go on?"

Paulino snorted between bruised and swollen features, shook his head in a vigorous nod and leaped back into the fray, much as a gored bull toward the matador.

Thursday night, Schmeling, the sharpshooter of Berlin, was the matador, sparing and wounding the Spaniard. After a slow beginning, with eight of nine mauling monotonous rounds that drew continual derision from a crowd of 45,000 spectators, Schmeling opened a slashing attack that shook the celebrated oak of the Pyrenees, even though it failed to cut him down. Paulino's head was bloody but unbowed, right up to the final charge, but he was thoroughly beaten nevertheless under the German's cutting uppercuts and jab.

Schmeling received the unanimous decision of Referee Arthur Donovan and the two judges. From the 10th round on there was no question of the result.

Schmeling fought with a cool, calculating air more suited to a veteran of Paulino's age of 31 than his own years of 23. The German found himself stymied by Paulino's awkward defensive tactics in the first eight or nine rounds. The Spaniard showed a healthy respect for Schmeling's right. For round after round they bored in, heads together.

The crowd booed and in the upper gallery once drifted into a chorus of "Sweet Adeline." Whether or not this annoyed Schmeling, he opened up with both hands in the 10th and quickly turned the fight into a bloody rout.

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## BROWNS TAKE SECOND PLACE FROM NEW YORK

## SARAZEN SETS PACE; PUTTING IS REMARKABLE

Winged Foot Club, Mamaroneck, N. Y. (AP)—Setting the pace for the field, Gene Sarazen scored the second 18 holes of the national open golf championship Friday in 71, one under par, to equal his opening round and total 142 for the two days' play.

Sarazen, duplicating his opening day's score, finished with a great exhibition of putting. Gene rolled in a 25-footer on the eighteenth for the birdie 3 that enabled him to crack par. This was the climax of a streak of six one-putt greens on the last seven holes. Altogether he took only 11 putts on the in ward nine of 35 after equalling par with a 36 out. The Stocky New York Italian's putting touch saved him repeatedly after he had wandered into the rough or traps. His most serious errors were in blasting too strongly out of traps. Three times he shot the ball clear across the green on the last nine but recovered each time to make the putts look easy.

Walter Hagen, the British open champion, finished his second round with a disastrous 81 for a two-day total of 157 that virtually put him out of the running. The "Hag" was wild from the start and took a seven at the sixteenth to cap the climax of his mistakes, requiring 42 strokes for the last nine.

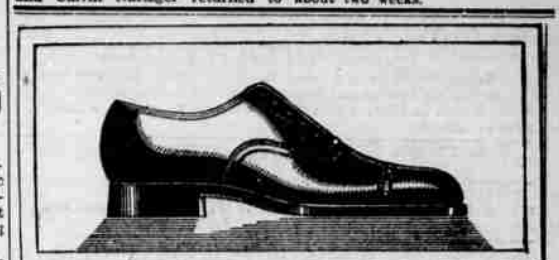
## BUYS NEW COMBINE
