Mrs. C. T. Gilbert, who underwent a major operation a week ago, is improving nicely. It is expected that she will return home Friday.

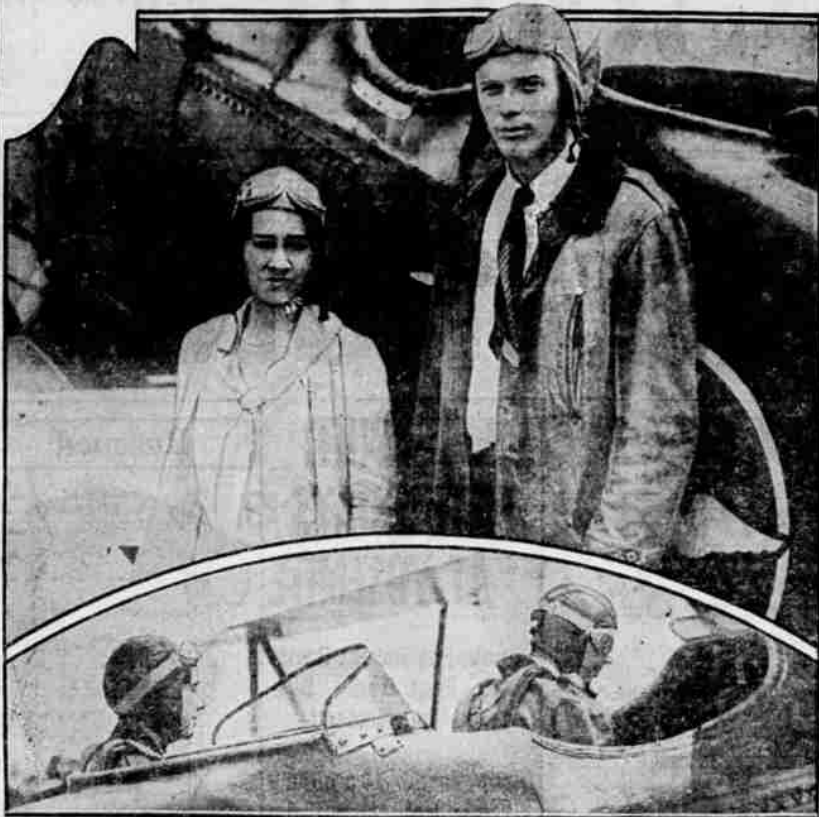
NIGHT SERVICE ENDS
