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HINTS for your SUNDAY DRIVE

We Suggest a Loop Trip to Neskowin... Devils Lake Newport and Corvallis

Take the West Side highway to Rickreall 10.4 miles, turn to the right at Rickreall and on 13.2 miles to Amity. At Amity take the Amity-Bellevue cut off 4.4 miles. Following the coast highway through Sheridan, Willamina, Grande Ronde to Hebo 41 miles. Turn left at Hebo through Cloverdale to Neskowin 12.6 miles. Then on down the Roosevelt highway to Devils lake 17.2 miles—then on down the coast 26.7 miles to Newport. Leaving Newport it is 58 miles to Corvallis and from Corvallis to Salem 37 miles, making a trip of 222.7 miles.

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
