

FRANK FUNERAL RITES ARE HELD FROM MT. ANGEL

Mt. Angel—Funeral services for the late William Frank were held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from St. Mary's church, with Rev. Father Dominic O. S. B. officiating. Interment was in Calvary cemetery.

Frank, who was 50 years of age, died Friday morning after a long illness. He was born February 17, 1879, in Germany, the son of Joseph and Walburga Frank. When he was only eleven years old, he came to the United States alone, to live with his grandparents in Elmhurst, Kansas, and when he was 20 years of age, he came to Mt. Angel, where he engaged in farming, and was expressman for the American Railway Express. August 8, 1905 he married Miss Anna Seeger of Mt. Angel, who survives him. Besides his widow, nine children survive him, Joseph, Mary, Rose, John, William Jr., Gregory, Margaret, Albert and Robert, all living here. He is survived by two sisters and a brother who live in Germany.
