

SENATORS RALLY IN EIGHTH TO DEFEAT VILLANS

Because they wouldn't admit they were licked and kept ever lastingly at the opposition, the Salem Senators staged an eighth inning rally at Olinger field Sunday afternoon which netted four runs and defeated the Montavilla club of Portland 11 to 9, in the first game of the second half of the Oregon-Washington league race. A two base clutch by Quinn and an overthrow of first base by Zimmerman, Villan third sacker, followed by Billy Sullivan's fifth hit of the day, sewed the game up for the solons, in the eighth.

It was a hectic affair, with the locals spotting the visitors to eight tallies in the third and fourth. Nothing daunted, although the game seemed lost, the Senators kept chiseling away and entered the eighth, needing two runs to tie the score. Edwards the first man up singled into right. He was followed by Russell who hit into left for a single. Quinn came up then and smashed out a two base hit into center, scoring Edwards and Russell. At this juncture Johnny Harkins, the left handed shot artist relieved him and forced Lamb to pop out to short. Bigbee shot a low one to Zim who heaved the ball five feet over first base, letting Quinn score. Sullivan then singled into center scoring Bigbee for the 11th tally. Cloninger fanned and Hafentfeld went out at first.

Barham was touched up for 13 hits during the seven innings he pitched. Russell relieved him at the start of the eighth and held the Villans to one hit during the remainder of the contest.

Sullivan was the batting hero of the day, getting a three bagger, two two base hits and a single out of five times up. For the Villans, Rogaway, Zimmerman and Grayson each got three hits.

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Jones Takes Title For Third Time; Espinosa Defeated Sunday By 23

New York (UP)—They tell of a negro servitor in the Atlanta Athletic club who insisted, anent the affair of the past four days at Winged Foot.

"That ain't no open championship. It is an invitation tournament."

"How do you figure that?" he was asked.

"Well, suh," explained the two-bottles-of-ginger-ale-and-four-set-ups boy, "I figure they just invites all the professionals and come and see if any of them can beat Bobby Jones."

It was demonstrated at Winged Foot that this is just about true. Bobby's worst round of any national open, a weird 79 on Saturday afternoon, had forced him into a tie for first place with Al Espinosa, the Glencoe, Ill., professional.

They played off for the title Sunday, and Jones won by 23 strokes in the course of 36 holes.

The Atlanta thus annexed his third open championship of the United States. He now holds both the open and amateur titles, although he must defend the latter honor at Pebble Beach in September.

Jones had an aggregate of 141 for the two rounds which comprised the play-off. Espinosa took 164. Representing the professional group which goes to the open championship each year, hopeful that one of its number will out-score Bobby, the swarthy Spanish-American went down to humiliating defeat.

"Old Man" Mickelson, former pilot of the Villans, couldn't keep away from his one-time charges. Although he wasn't on the bench Sunday, he was in the stands and seemed to take the defeat as much to heart as if he had been in personal charge.

Barham, despite his ineffectiveness at times, pitched himself out of a tight hole in the seventh Sunday. With the bases loaded and none down, he fanned Johnny Harkins for the third time, and forced Mair and Goleman to fly out.
