DENY CACHET FOR USE HERE FOR AIRPORT

Cachet collectors will be disappointed upon learning that the post-office authorities have turned down the request of the Salem chamber of commerce that a special cachet or stamp cancelling die be put into use here, August 8, in connection with the dedication of the new airport on that date.

Word of the refusal of the postal authorities to grant the request was received Monday from E. B. Wadsworth, superintendent of air mail, Washington, D. C., by Postmaster John H. Farrar. Wadsworth states that the use of special cachet on air mail is confined to newly established routes and in placing of additional stamps on existing routes.

In the same communication Wadsworth says the time is not ripe for the establishment of a regular air mail stop here.

The air mail route operating between Seattle and Portland is necessarily on a limited schedule, he writes, "and depends in a large measure for its success upon reaching San Francisco in time to make afternoon carrier connections and in reaching Portland and Seattle in time to connect with deliveries the same day."

Appreciation of the interest taken in the mail service here was expressed by Wadsworth.

Editors of Oregon Enjoy Outing Given By Newport People

Probably no organization in Oregon has ever made a bigger effort or a more successful one to entertain the State Editorial association than did the Newport chamber of commerce when the newspapermen adjourned at Albany Saturday and went to the popular resort city by the sea to finish off the annual convention.

In this the Newport chamber had the assistance of all the people of the place. Newport is a genial, neighborly, glad-to-see-you place at all times, and this spirit was never more in evidence than during Saturday evening and Sunday when the newspaper publishers and editors were guests of the town. As for the weather, it was perfect, so nothing was missing to make it all a thoroughly enjoyable occasion. A lot of the journalists—as they are sometimes known to the laity—brought their wives and children, and were glad they did when they saw what Newport had to offer.

The program started off with a sea-foot banquet at the city hall Saturday night. Just one thing was lacking to make this a hundred per cent affair. Someone neglected to mention the name of the person who supervised the preparation of that banquet. Some of the visitors had driven a hundred miles to be there, and they were hungry. And the dinner was superb.

Some names that should be mentioned among the speakers at the banquet are not remembered by this writer, because he has mislaid his program. Reference is made to the mayor of Newport and to the head of the chamber of commerce.

The former spoke of scenic assets to that part of the Oregon coast that even many Oregonians do not know about. The latter made a plea for the support of Oregon industry. The talk by Bert Allen, head of the Lions club, was a classic in humor. Robert W. Sawyer of Bend told what the state highway commission is doing to prevent the mutilation of scenery by power lines and advertising signs along the highways. Dr. Carter, a veteran of the Indian service, spoke about Indian life and boasted the wonders of the coast country. A neat impromptu speech that was warmly applauded was made by Commander Patterson of the man of war Farragut, now in Newport harbor. Mrs. Doris Smith, director of the Eugene Trail to Rail passenger, spoke briefly in behalf of that event. The country's coercive laws were hard hit by General U. G. McAlexander.

It was appropriate that the place of prominence on the program should be given Frank Davey, veteran Oregon newspaperman and legislator, who gave a reminiscent address on newspaper men and the press. Dr. Davey helped organize the Oregon Newspaper association at Newport over 40 years ago.

A sort of man behind the gun for the whole Newport program was Bob Davey, son of Frank. Bob is editor of the Newport Journal and is one of the fraternity who know how to put punch into a weekly newspaper.

Entertainment at the dance hall, the nat and the skating rink followed the banquet and the beach was at the disposal of the visitors Sunday. Deep sea trips were scheduled Sunday. A large crowd went out on the first boat, and got a rare thrill when life boats began to stand by and the life guards ordered the excursionists to put on life preservers. Although the weather was perfect, on shore the sea was rough and the sea sickness of the big government dredge, Cal. Michie, remained in port. The next excursion trip was cancelled. Hundreds visited the destroyer Farragut.

NO INFECTION IN SWIMMING POOLS OR HOLES

Marion county has no swimming holes or swimming pools that are a menace to public health and safety, says Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer. Harry Sinks, the county sanitary inspector, has visited practically all of the swimming places in the county and finds the majority of them in good condition so far as sanitary facilities are concerned. A thorough survey of the public swimming resorts of the county's streams and rivers will be started by the county health officer this week and a comparative rating given.

Nose and throat infections which are much more numerous when swimming is in vogue, are caused by the action of water itself and not necessarily by water which contains disease germs, says the health officer. The water irritates the membranes of the head and throat passages which already hold the infection.

Dr. Douglas says that cases of typhoid resulting from swimmers swallowing contaminated water are unusual as good swimmers swallow very little water.

Mr. Sinks, the sanitary inspector, found that particularly were the indoor pools in the county, in good condition.

Inspection of the 34 auto camps in the county, five more camps than were in operation last year, has been completed by Sinks. Water samples were taken at all the camps and in those cases where improvement is necessary the owners are cooperating with the health unit in securing better water.

Sinks is now starting an inspection of all the industrial camps, the berry, hop and logging camps in the county. A state law requires such inspection where five or more people are in camp either temporarily or permanently.

HIKERS CLIMB MARY'S PEAK

Ten snow capped peaks were visible, from Mt. Hatter on the north to Diamond Peak on the south, to the party of 125 hikers who made the ascent of Mary's peak Sunday. The day, although somewhat warm was ideal for mountain climbing and the 20 Chemeketas who were with the group report a wonderful trip.

Obsidians of Eugene, Mazamas and Trails club members and Chemeketas from Salem met at Corvallis Saturday night, where they had dinner. From there they went by machine to the C. K. Spaulding Logging company camp near the base of the mountain for the overnight stop.

Addis Miller, one of the Salem hikers received a sprained ankle when she jumped from a bridge to the trail below. She was unable to proceed and was taken back to the camp, a distance of about 25 miles by Stanley Vail, a Mr. Jewell and a forest ranger. It is believed no bones were broken.

The Chemeketas returned to Salem Sunday evening about 9 o'clock.

FINAL REPORT IN FISHER ESTATE

A final supplemental report in probate on the estate of the late Dr. E. E. Fisher filed by the United States National bank as executor shows that since the final report filed late in 1927 receipts, including \$6,018.92 in cash as of the final report, amounted to \$28,709.98 with disbursements of \$24,623.85 leaving a balance in cash from receipts of \$2,395.13. The disbursements included payments of income to legatees. Assets of the estate in hand amount to \$71,106.77.

The bank states in its supplemental report that it is made as final closing of the estate was delayed after the final report due to a court action by Harold Cook which has now been settled.

The report says that under the will Alice S. Fisher is given a life estate in two-thirds of the property which is to go to Arthur Fisher on her death. The value of the estate was appraised at \$75,243.80 and the legatees have agreed that in order not to sell the personal property to accept the same at its appraised value in lieu of cash and accept the assets on hand in full settlement.

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GIRL RESERVES OPEN SANTALY CAMP JULY 9

Camp Santaly, Salem's Y. W. C. A. Girl Reserve camp on the little north fork of the Santiam river, will be opened for the first time this year when the grade school Girl Reserves go to camp July 9. The younger girls will remain a week and will move out to make room for the junior high girls who will be in camp from July 16 to 23. From July 23 to 30 the senior high girls will occupy the camp.

A big camp rally for all girls interested will be held at the Y. W. C. A. rooms Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock.

Mrs. Eric Butler will be camp manager this year and Mrs. George R. K. Morehead is program director. Mrs. Harold Rowley will be swimming instructor and Miss Esther Lisle the recreation director.

The total camp expense for one week is six dollars. The program for the day starts with a morning dip in the river or setting-up exercises at six forty-five, breakfast at seven-thirty, camp duties and inspection, flag raising and worship, recreation, such as baseball, handicraft and nature study, and tribal councils in the morning; dinner at noon and quiet hour until two-thirty when swimming is scheduled, hikes and short trips until supper time at six, flag lowering, camp fire, music and taps at nine thirty.

Add a little sugar to the vegetables while they are cooking.

Try these Glazed Onions recommended by one of the experts. Peel enough medium-size silver-skin onions to make a quart. Prick onions through centers to prevent breaking while cooking. Place in boiling salted water to which a tablespoon of sugar per quart has been added. Simmer until tender and brown. Melt two tablespoons of butter in a pan. Add a dash of granulated sugar. Cook to the bubbling stage. Add the onions and stir until well glazed.
