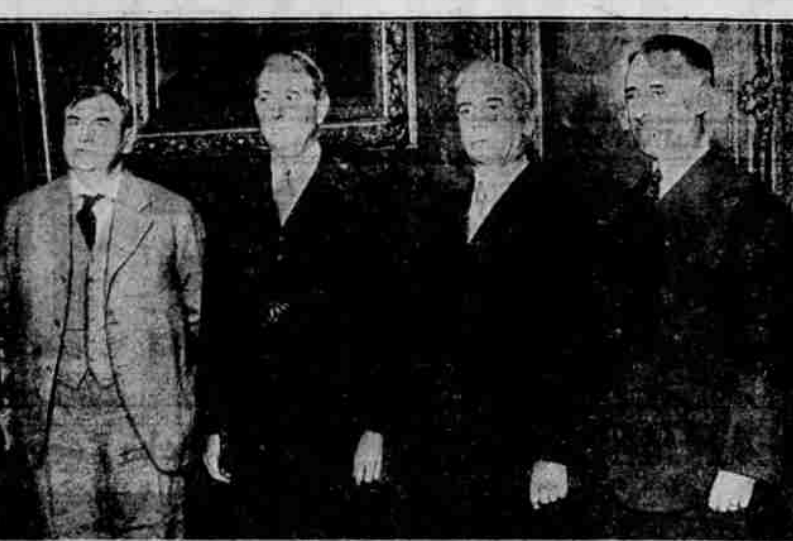
BULLARDS MAKE CALL

Woodburn — J. J. Hall was elected by the city council Tuesday night at the regular meeting as councilman to fill the unexpired term of W. F. Norman, resigned. The election was unanimous. Petitions were presented signed by a large number of residents in ward No. 2 in favor of J. J. Hall and E. J. Allen, the Hall petition containing the larger number of signatures. Councilman Beach reported that a grade had been given to property owners on South Front street to construct cement sidewalk and that the walk was in the process of construction.

Recorder Beebe was instructed to have the deed issued to the city by Elizabeth Hunt sent up for record. This deed covered the property on which the north septic tank now stands.

The street commissioner's acceptance of the improvement of Sixth street was approved. Bills for the month were allowed.
