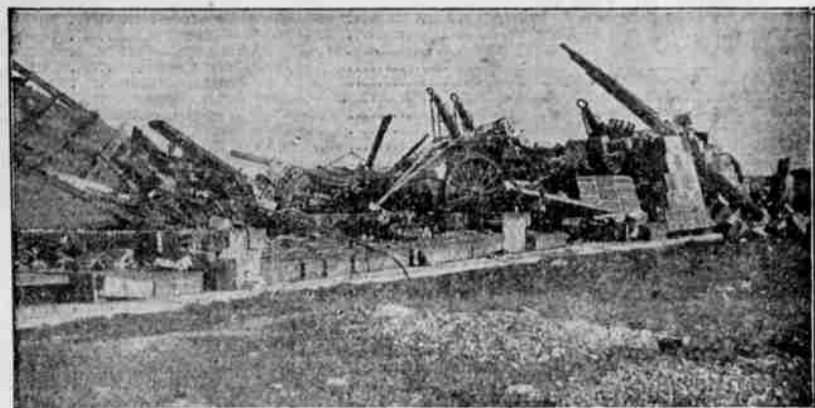

## WIND STORM DESTROYS GOVERNMENT ARSENAL



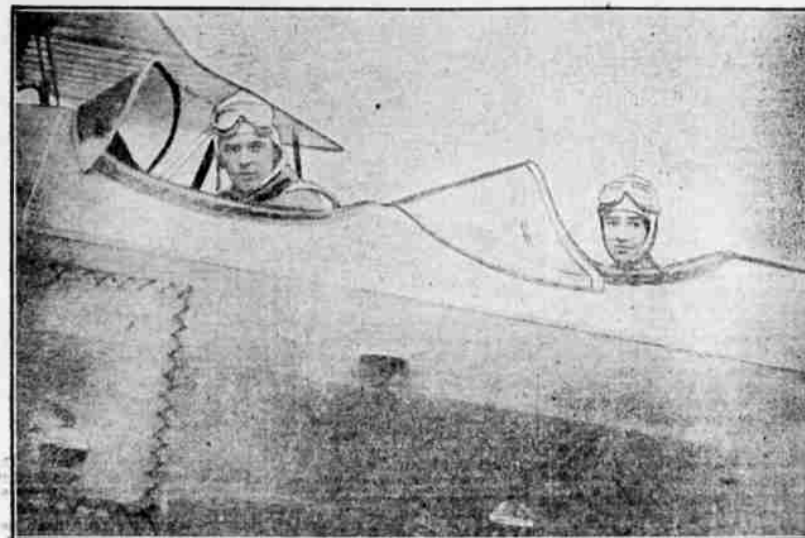

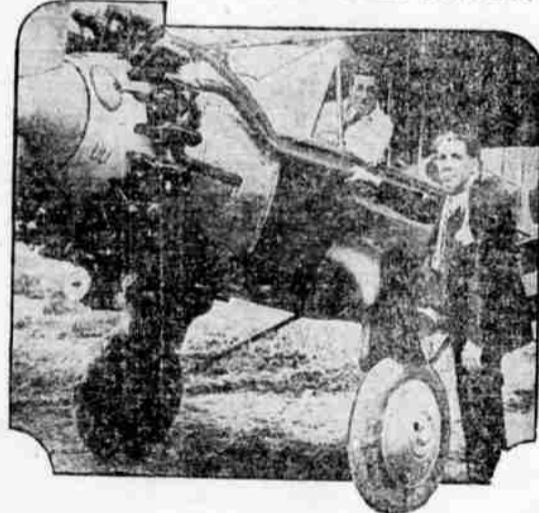

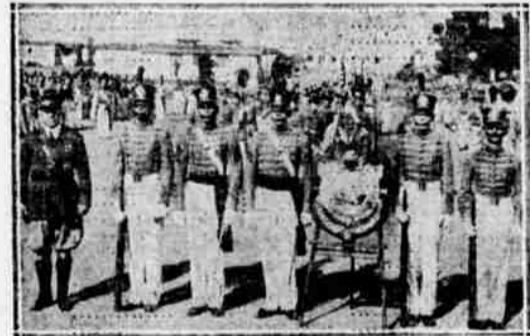

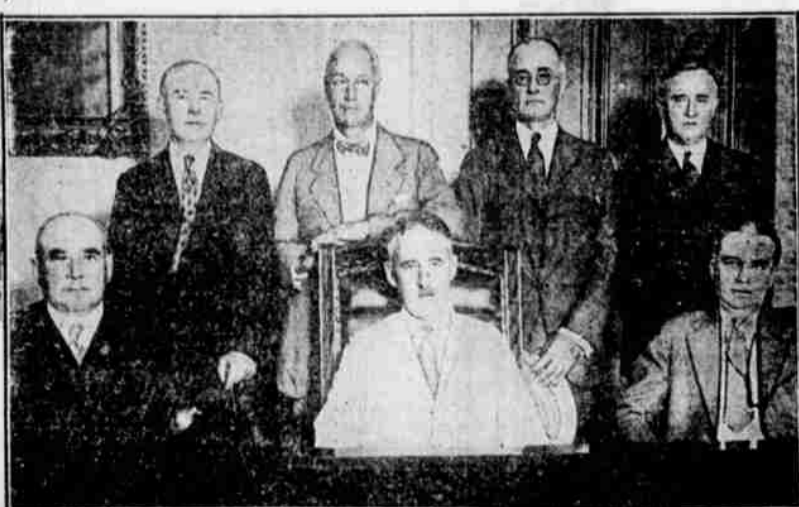
John Lord O'Brian of Buffalo, N. Y., has been appointed an assistant attorney general to succeed William J. Donovan.

## REPARATIONS DELEGATES REPORT TO STIMSON



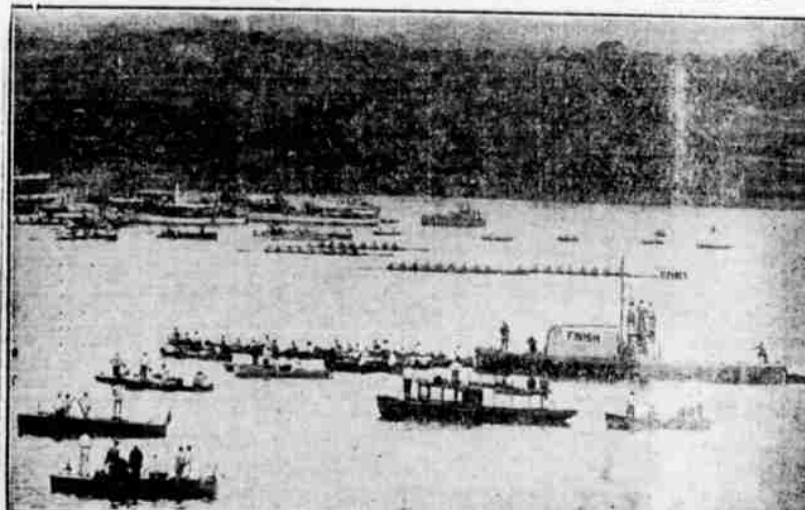
