

COUNTY RELIGIOUS EDUCATION COUNCIL CONVENES

NORTH MARION GROUP CHOOSES BETHEL, FALL

Woodburn—The North Marion council of religious education held its quarterly meeting in the Church of God camp ground Sunday. This council embraces the various Protestant Sunday schools from Gervais to Aurora and to the county lines on east and west sides. It was presided over by Rev. John T. Myers of Woodburn with Mrs. O. F. Larson of the Bethel church as secretary.

The various Sunday schools uniting, met at 10:15 o'clock with separate classes for men, women, young people, boys and girls and little folks. Following the Sunday school a morning worship took place at 11:15 o'clock. O. F. Larson led the song service with Mrs. Larson at the piano. Prayer was offered by Rev. Henry G. Hanson of the Presbyterian church. The message of the morning was a sermon exposition of John's gospel, chapter 4, the story of the Samaritan woman, given by Dr. Walter L. Van Nuys, field secretary of the board of Christian education for the Synod of Oregon. Dr. Van Nuys returned just the day before, from a three months' trip to the Holy Land and with his recent experiences vividly in mind he gave the chapter a thoroughly oriental setting, which made it very interesting.

At the noon hour the whole assembly united in a potluck dinner. A number of boys from the state training school were guests and also sang for the people.

At 2 o'clock the afternoon program began with song and prayer with Miss Ruth Shrock at the piano and the president, Rev. John T. Myers in the chair. Prayer was offered by Rev. H. L. Grafton, of Gervais. Musical numbers were a ladies' quartet by the Shrock cousins, a solo by Mr. Harper of Gervais and duet and solo from the people of the Church of God. The message of the afternoon was given by Dr. W. T. Milliken, head of the Baptist theological seminary of Portland. He took for his theme "The Question of the Greeks," and in an impressive manner brought to the people the need and the method of seeing Jesus. The whole program was splendidly impressive. There were several hundred people in attendance. The next meeting will be held in the Bethel Presbyterian church on the second Sunday in October.

EYERLY TAKES MANY AWARDS IN AIR DERBY

Flying in competition with various aircraft of standard manufacture, Lee Eyerly, Salem airplane designer and manufacturer, flew back to Salem Sunday with a major portion of the awards offered by the American Legion at the third annual air circus sponsored by Delbert Reeves past of that city.
