PHONE SERVICE INSTALLED ON CASCADE TRAIN

The first inter-car telephone system on a railroad train is about to be added to the conveniences of modern rail transportation. Developed and perfected by experimental use with special equipment the installation will make its appearance on the Cascade, Southern Pacific fast passenger train running between San Francisco and Portland. Installation of the phone system is being completed by Southern Pacific for use by passengers as part of the service provided on the Cascade.

A telephone instrument will be placed in each pullman car in the train. Connections will run to the diner, club and observation cars. With the inter-car communication lines in operation it will be possible for passengers to send and receive messages from any part of the train, and a practical travel asset to the traveler telephone will save many steps.

For instance, passengers may use the telephone to order meals from the diner or inquire if seats are available at the time they wish to have their meals - or they may have refreshments sent to them from the club car. See if the barber is busy; call the maid; summon train attendants and officials; obtain all available service without the inconvenience of walking through the train or sending the porter on an errand. The telephone lines will lead to the dining car steward's desk, the club car attendant's station, the porter's lounge and the barber shop. Connections may be obtained with all the ease of home operation of phones.

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CHOIR OF 80 TRAINING TO SING AT CONVENTION

A picked choir of 80 trained voices from the Marion county parishes and from Portland, under the direction of Joseph Prange, will sing the Stungenberger "Missa Stabat Mater" at the open air Pontifical High Mass at the state fairgrounds next Sunday at the Mass meeting of the 73rd national convention of the Catholic central society of America which will open here Sunday.

Stingers from Sublimity, Shaw, Stayton, Mt. Angel, Silverton, Woodburn, and St. Paul have been coming to Salem once a week for the past three months to rehearse for the open air Mass which will be heard, according to the first estimates, by at least 15,000 men and women.

The celebrant will be Most Rev. Edward D. Howard, D. D., archbishop of Portland. After the altar will be arranged on the veranda of the main exhibit building of the fairgrounds. As many benches and chairs as possible will be arranged in the big quadrangle facing the main exhibit building.

Amplifiers will carry the voices of the celebrant, the choir, and of Rev. Charles D. White, D. D., bishop of Spokane, who will give the sermon, a distance of at least 1500 feet.

The program of the Mass meeting which will be Catholic day for all of Oregon, is scheduled to begin at three o'clock Sunday afternoon.

GRANT RIGHTS FOR PHONE CONDUIT

Members of the county court had practically decided Monday afternoon to grant the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company permission to lay their underground conduit along the county's road only from the Clackamas county line to Aurora instead of all the way to Woodburn as was requested by the utility company.

For their conduit line for long distance service from Portland to San Francisco now in the process of construction, the telephone company asks the county court to lay its cable 14 feet from the center of the Boone's ferry road from the crossing a mile below Wilsonville to Woodburn. The first two miles of the distance are improved and 14 feet from the center would not harm the existing road but the county court refuses to give permission for the conduit construction between Aurora and Woodburn. This road is not improved but is slated for market road construction.

WOLF TIRE SHOP OPEN FOR BUSINESS

The Wolf Tire shop, under the direction of Walter W. Wolf, who recently removed here from his home near Forest Grove, was opened Saturday at Commercial and Perry streets, in the room formerly occupied by the Zeeel Tire company.

A full line of Pennsylvania tires and tubes will be handled by the company. Expert tire repair men have been placed in charge of the vulcanizing department.

SUNDAY SALEM DAY, CATHOLIC CONVENTION

Sunday will be Salem's day at the 73rd annual national convention of the Catholic Central Society of America and the 13th annual convention of the National Catholic Women's union which will be in session here from July 13 to 18. On that day Catholics from Marion county will be hosts to all visiting delegates and to Catholics and all others interested from all parts of Oregon, Washington, and California.

The delegates will arrive in special trains from the east Saturday afternoon, a mass meeting will be held at the fairgrounds all day Sunday beginning with an open air pontifical high mass at 10:30, and an entertainment of an interesting nature will be furnished in St. Joseph's auditorium on Chemeketa street Sunday evening. Monday morning the actual work of the national conventions will begin with Central Veterinarians in St. Joseph's hall and session of the Women's union in Sacred Heart academy. All sessions will be open to the public.

The dinners and the lunches which will be served at the fairgrounds Sunday noon and the presentation of the play in St. Joseph's hall Sunday evening, are the only entertainment which the Salem and Marion county Catholics are arranging for the national convention delegates. Delegates will depend on Salem hotels and Salem restaurants for lodging and for food at all other times during the five day session. Salem theaters will be their form of entertainment also at all other times.

The housing committee is arranging a list of homes which will accept the visitors but this list will not be used until the hotels of the city are filled to capacity.

St. Joseph's parish of Salem will serve a 75 cent dinner in Mrs. Olmsted's restaurant on the fairgrounds Sunday noon and the women from the Silverton and Shaw parishes will serve a 35 cent lunch in the automobile display building.

Arrangements are now being made for the decoration of the streets of the city during convention week. Special decorations will be arranged in the church and convention hall block and at the fairgrounds.

ORDER HEARING ON GRADE CROSSING

The Market street grade crossing of the Southern Pacific company in Salem, where Mrs. Charlotte Hardy of Medford was fatally injured June 16 when a train crashed into the automobile in which she was riding, is to be the subject of a hearing ordered by the public service commission. The hearing will be July 20 at the offices of the commission.

The hearing is ordered by the commission on its own motion, based on an informal investigation which led the commission to the conclusion that sufficient cause exists to warrant a formal investigation as to the hazardous condition of the crossing.

PROGRAM FOR CONVENTION OF CATHOLICS OUT

Five thousand copies of the souvenir program of the 73rd annual convention of the Catholic Central society of America which will meet west of the Rockies for the first time when its convention opens here Saturday, have been received from the printer and are being assorted for distribution in the convention headquarters in the Bank of Commerce building.

The souvenir program is a good sized and well bound book of 60 pages well illustrated with cuts. It contains a history of the Catholic church in the Oregon country, sketches the history of the organization of the Catholic Central society and outlines its purposes and lists some of its accomplishments since its organization in Baltimore 74 years ago, it gives a history and the purposes of the Catholic Women's union.

A discursive article on Salem and other towns and cities of the Willamette valley, the full convention program, and a discussion of the work of the Catholic Truth society in Oregon are also contained in the souvenir booklet.

Official convention delegates will be presented with the souvenir program and each will be given a limited number of the books to be distributed in their home states.

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FLEEING MAN TOLD TO STOP SHOT IN LEGS
