

HEWITT CLAN HAS REUNION AT UNIONVALE

Unionvale—The eleventh annual family reunion of the descendants of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hewitt, pioneers of 1842, was held in the oak grove on the Adam Hewitt farm, which is a portion of the original Hewitt donation land claim, Saturday.

Mr. and Mrs. Hewitt came overland by ox team from Pike county, Missouri, and located in this community.

Ninety-one persons many of them neighbors here, were present and many of them from a distance remaining over Sunday. A basket dinner was served.

During the business meeting as has been the custom in past years the eldest surviving son, Henry Hewitt, was re-elected president; the second surviving son, Adam Hewitt, re-elected vice-president; Miss Ruth Hewitt of Portland secretary, re-elected. A resolution was passed to furnish funds to have the late Adam Hewitt's name placed on the Oregon historical list. He was a pioneer of 1842, and a brother of Henry Hewitt, and was at Champego and voted at the mass meeting there in 1843. His name has been omitted from the historical list. The movement for a marker to be erected here honoring Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hewitt has received hearty support and plans are under way to have it completed within the coming year.

The surviving seven sons who were all present were Judge Henry Adam Hewitt Dayton, Ore.; Dr. Jasper H. Hewitt and Dr. Lorin L. Hewitt, 83, of Albany, Ore.; Hewitt, Portland, Ore.; Isaiah Hewitt, Salem, Ore.; Matthew Hewitt, Roseville, Cal.; and Harry Hewitt, Estacada, Ore. And the widows of the two departed sons were present, Mrs. Daniel Hewitt, Monmouth, Ore. and Mrs. Andrew Hewitt, Unionvale, Ore. Matthew Hewitt and grandson Percy Doernfeld of Roseville, Cal. came the greatest distance.
